## MINUTES

OF THE

# PROCEEDINGS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF AUSTRALIA.

### SESSION FOURTH.

At Melbourne, and within the Assembly Hall, Collins-street, on Wednesday, the 20th day of September, 1905, at 7 p.m.

- 1. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Opening of Australia convened. Public worship was conducted by the Right Assembly. Rev. the Retiring Moderator (Dr. Bruce), who preached from John vii. 48. After sermon, the Assembly was constituted with prayer by the Moderator.
- 2. THE ROLL of Assembly, as printed in the White Book, was Roll tabled laid on the table, declared of *interim* authority, and ordered to be finally adjusted after the confirmation of the Minutes to-morrow morning.
- 3. THE MODERATOR, having intimated that the Moderator and Moderator the ex-Moderators of the General Assembly, and the Moderators of

the State Assemblies, had agreed to nominate for the Moderator's Chair the Rev. P. J. Murdoch, M.A., Minister at Camberwell, Melbourne, the Rev. John Ferguson moved:—That Mr. Murdoch's nomination be sustained, and that he be elected Moderator of this Assembly. The motion was seconded by the Rev. Dr. Meiklejohn, and carried on the voices.

Mr. Murdoch was conducted to the Chair, and delivered a suitable address.

Leave of absence to Senior Clerk. 4. THE JUNIOR CLERK read a letter from the Senior Clerk, addressed to Dr. Bruce, the retiring Moderator, intimating that his sight was not yet sufficiently strong to enable him to read and write with comfort, and asking leave of absence for this Session.

The leave asked was granted, and the Assembly instructed the Junior Clerk to convey by telegram to Dr. Laing its sympathy and its prayer for the full restoration of his sight.

Thanks to Ex-Moderator. **5.** ON THE motion of the Rev. Dr. Meiklejohn, duly seconded, the Assembly resolved:—That cordial thanks be given to the ex-Moderator for the thoughtful and appropriate sermon preached by him at the opening of the Assembly, and also for his abundant labours in the service of the Church during his term of office.

Hours of meeting.

6. IT WAS AGREED that after Thursday the hours of meeting for this Session be:—Morning Sederunt, 11 a.m. to 4.30 p.m., with an interval of an hour, 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.; Evening Sederunt, 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Business Committee. 7. The following were appointed the Business Committee for the Session, with instructions to meet each day at the close of the Morning Sederunt (4.30 p.m.):—The Rev. R. G. Macintyre (Convener), the Junior Clerk, the Revs. R. Scott West, J. Walker, Dr. Meiklejohn, A. Stewart, J. Lundie, W. Gray, J. Heyer, H. C. Matthew; and Messrs. W. Wood, J. M. Campbell, R. J. Shilliday, W. J. Hill, and George Kerr.

Committee of Selection.

8. THE FOLLOWING were appointed a Committee of Selection to nominate Assembly representatives on the Judicial Commission, the Board of Missions, and the Standing Committees:—Rev. Dr. E. Gray (Convener), Revs. Dr. Clouston, J. Paterson, J. T. Robertson, G. Ewan, H. C. Matthew; and Mr. W. Affleck, Hon. J. Balfour, Messrs. Alex. Mayes, Thos. Mitchell, D. Storrer.

The Committee of Selection was instructed to meet to-morrow Scrutineers (Thursday) at 9 a.m., and to give in the names proposed by noon. It was agreed that additional nominations may be received up to the close of Thursday evening's Sederunt, and that a ballot (if required) be taken on Friday at 2 p.m. The following were appointed Scrutineers of the ballot, with instructions to prepare the voting papers:—Revs. R. E. Davies, W. H. Ash, and Mr. W. Wood and Dr. Macfarland.

9. THE ASSEMBLY adjourned to meet to-morrow at 10 a.m. for Adjournment. the observance of the Lord's Supper, and at 11 a.m. for the transaction of business, whereof public intimation having been given, the Sederunt was closed with prayer.

#### SECOND SEDERUNT.

At Melbourne, and within the Assembly Hall, Collins-street, on Thursday, the 21st day of September, 1905, at 10 a.m.

- 10. THE MEMBERS of the Assembly united in a Communion Ser-Lord's Supper vice, conducted by the Moderator, assisted by Rev. R. G. Macintyre, B.D., and Rev. R. W. Rock.
- 11. At the conclusion of the Service the Assembly was consti-Assembly constituted. tuted with prayer by the Moderator.
- 12. THE MINUTES of the First Sederunt were read and con-Minutes firmed.
- 13. THE final adjustment of the Roll was postponed, and Pres-Adjustment of Roll postponed, byteries which have not sent in complete returns were instructed to meet and appoint additional representatives, and report before the close of this Sederunt.
- 14. THE REV. DR. J. G. PATON was appointed a member ex Dr. J. G. Paton a member officio of this Assembly.
- 15. THE PETITIONS of the Rev. J. H. Macgoun, W. A. Hobson, Petitions remitted to Charles D. P. Taylor, D. McFarlane, and the Petition of the Rev. R. Committees. A. Redmond and the Reference from the State Assembly of New South Wales were remitted to the Committee on Reception of Ministers, with instructions to report to a future Sederunt.

The Petitions of Messrs. H. M. Ogilvie, G. Cranston, J. C. Gibson, J. Anderson, J. T. Kelly, J. F. Sims, W. Tulloch, F. L. A. Schloeffel, T. V. Charlton, William Bett, Joseph H. Lee, R. B. Garner, Horatio O'Sullivan, Richard B. Osborne were remitted to the College Committee, with instructions to report to a future Sederunt.

Report : Selection Committee.

**16.** THE REPORT of the Selection Committee was received, and ordered to be posted in a prominent place or places.

Report : Home

17. THE REPORT on Home Missions was submitted by the Rev. J. Ferguson, Joint-Convener. The Report was received.

Committee of the Whole.

The Assembly went into Committee of the Whole to consider the Scheme for the training of Home Missionaries, the Moderator as Chairman, and the Clerk as Clerk.

Scheme for training of Home Missionaries.

The Assembly resumed and the Clerk reported that the Scheme of Training of Home Mission Agents had been passed as follows:—

- 1. That the Agents who are to be admitted to this special course of training be men who are over twenty-three years of age, approved of as to attainments, gifts, and Christian consistency by the State Assembly having proper jurisdiction, and accepted by the General Assembly of Australia.
- 2. That such accepted Agents shall devote themselves to a preliminary course of training, and (1) within four years from date of their acceptance by the General Assembly pass (a) the Matriculation examination of a recognised University, or (b) the Senior Public Examination in connection with such University, and, also within the same period, attend and pass at least four University classes approved of by the General Assembly's College Committee, or (2) pursue a course of study, with annual examination, for four years under direction of the General Assembly's College Committee on such subjects and text books as are approved by the said Committee.
- 3. That during the course special attention shall be given to the contents of the English Bible, to English Language and Literature, Logic, Mental and Moral Philosophy, and History.
- 4. (a) That those who pass either of the authorised courses shall be eligible as candidates for entrance to one of the Theological Halls of the Church, and shall be examined on all the subjects of the syllabus, save Latin. Greek and Hebrew; (b) but where there is no Theological Hall within the State, and attendance at either of the existing Halls is, in the opinion of the College Committee, impracticable, it shall be in the power of the College Committee to appoint a special course of study with periodical examinations in Theological, Biblical, Historical, and Apologetical subjects.
- 5. That during the recess of the Hall the Agents shall as far as possible be provided with work in their respective States.
- 6. That after finishing their course and passing the Exit Examination, save in Greek and Hebrew, they shall serve in the State in which their preliminary training was given for a period of at least three years.

7. That, where any dispute shall arise as to the States named in Clauses 5 and 6, it shall be determined by the Home Mission Committee of the General Assembly of Australia.

It was moved by the Rev. John Ferguson, and seconded by the Motion. (Adopted.) Rev. W. D. Fairbairn:—That the Report from the Committee of the Whole be adopted, with the exception of par. (b) of sec. (4).

It was moved as an amendment by the Rev. A. Stewart, and Motion. seconded by the Rev. J. V. McNair:—That all the words after the word "Report" be omitted, with a view of inserting the words "be approved of, with the addition of New Testament Greek to the list of subjects in par. 3."

The amendment was rejected on a division, the numbers being 49 for and 50 against.

The motion was approved.

Paragraph (b) of Section 4 was approved, and the Business Committee instructed to prepare a Remit thereanent.

It was also agreed to send the whole Scheme to Presbyteries for their information.

It was moved by the Rev. A. Stewart, and seconded by the Rev. Amendment J. V. McNair:—That the question of the omission of New Testament Greek be remitted to Presbyteries and State Assemblies.

The motion was rejected.

- 18. THE REV. W. FRASER gave notice of his intention at a Motion: future Sederunt to move:—That the General Assembly of the Presservation Church of Australia heartily support the anti-Opium movement, and, in view of the terrible physical and moral degradation that invariably attends the habitual use of the drug, strongly urge the Commonwealth Government to introduce legislation to prohibit the importation of opium save for medicinal purposes.
- 19. THE Board of Management of the Ascot Vale Congregation Board of Management applied for authority to meet this evening. The authority was meeting. granted.
- 20. THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY adjourned to meet at 7 p.m., adjournment, which having been publicly intimated, the Sederunt was closed with prayer.

#### THIRD SEDERUNT.

At Melbourne, and within the Assembly Hall, Collins-street, on Thursday, the 21st day of September, 1905, at 7 p.m.

Assembly constituted.

21. THE ASSEMBLY met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with reading the Scriptures, and prayer by the Moderator.

Report : Rusiness Committee. 22. THE REPORT of the Business Committee, with the order of business for Friday, was submitted by the Convener of the Business Committee, and approved.

Communication Rev. G. Ewan. 23. THE LETTER of the Rev. G. Ewan, Convener of Home Mission Committee of Queensland, anent services at Thursday Island, was received, and remitted to the Home Mission Committee, with instructions to report to a future Sederunt.

Home Missions Report resumed. 24. The Assembly resumed consideration of the Report on Home Missions.

Deliverance.

It was moved by the Rev. J. Ferguson, and seconded by the Rev. Dr. Meiklejohn:—That the Assembly

Express gratification that the returns from the several States furnish considerable grounds of encouragement; that the Home Mission Committees show such zeal in furthering the extension of Christ's Kingdom; that so many agents labour with praiseworthy diligence and loyalty, especially amid the trying difficulties of the sparsely-peopled areas.

Commend the claims of the Churches of Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, and Western Australia upon the sympathy and support of the stronger Churches of New South Wales and Victoria.

Convey cordial thanks to the Home Churches for their generous provision of men and money to Queensland and Western Australia, and express the hope that assistance so valuable in the urgent need of those Churches will be continued.

Addresses.

The Rev. H. C. Matthew, of Western Australia; the Rev. G. Ewan, of Queensland; the Rev. A. R. Osborn, of Tasmania; the Rev. R. Mitchell, of South Australia; the Rev. D. A. Cameron, of Victoria; and the Rev. Dr. Clouston, of New South Wales, addressed the Assembly on Home Mission Work in their respective States.

Thanks.

The Moderator, on behalf of the Assembly, thanked the speakers for their addresses.

The motion was approved.

25. THE REV. DR. MEIKLEJOHN gave notice of his intention at a Notice of Motion:
Article X.

That with the view of giving effect to Article X. of the Articles of Agreement, which provides that reports of a full and definite kind shall be forwarded to the General Assembly from each State Assembly on all matters pertaining to the work and welfare of the Church, including Home Missions, Sabbath Schools, and the State of Religion and Morals, a Standing Committee be appointed to receive these reports and bring them before the Assembly; that this Committee be named the Sabbath School and State of Religion Committee, and that the Moderator be Convener.

**26.** THE ASSEMBLY adjourned to meet to-morrow at 11 a.m., Adjournment which having been publicly intimated, the Sederunt closed with prayer.

- At Melbourne, and within the Assembly Hall, Collins-street, on Friday, the 22nd day of September, 1905, at 11 a.m.
- **27.** THE ASSEMBLY met pursuant to adjournment, and was Assembly, constituted with reading the Scriptures, and prayer by the Moderator.
- 28. THE MINUTES of the Second and Third Sederunts were read Minutes and confirmed.
- 29. APOLOGIES for absence were received from the Rev. Dr. D. Apologies Paton, Dr. Hay, Messrs. T. W. Fleming, J. Murray, and the Procurator.
- **30.** THE REV. J. T. ROBERTSON gave notice of his intention, Notice of Morion: when the Report of the Sabbath School Hymnary Committee is be-sabbath School Hymnary.

That the Assembly re-affirms the resolution of the Assembly of 1902, as to the urgent need of a Hymn Book for our Sabbath Schools; affirms the desirability of the compilation, under the authority of the Assembly, of an Australian Sunday School Hymn Book; instructs the Committee to give special consideration to this proposal, and to obtain full and detailed information as to its practicability; and empowers the Committee, if they see fit, to proceed

with the work of compilation, with the view of being in a position to submit a definite proposal to next meeting of the General Assembly.

Approve heartily of Mr. Hey's generosity in providing a boat for the Aborigines at Mapoon, and express the hope that this may not only be the means of keeping them at the Station, but also of enabling them later on to earn a living for themselves.

Thank the Queensland Government for its generosity to the Mission.

Thank the Commonwealth Government for its generous help in subsidising the Maritime Service, and urge it to encourage the settlement of Australians in the New Hebrides, and to take such steps as may result either in the annexation of the group or in securing their perpetual independence.

Also thank the Treasurer and Hon. Auditor for their services.

Urge all the Churches to increased liberality toward Foreign Missions, and resolve that the salaries and ordinary expenses at North Queensland for next five years—that is, from 30th September, 1905, to 30th September, 1910—shall be paid by an assessment on the basis of membership of the State Churches, also that the present balance of £246 15s. 9d., and the amount owing to the Moravian Board be paid on the same basis, and that the payment be extended over two years from the present date.

DEAR BROTHER,—Will you kindly submit this letter to the next Annual Meeting of the Supreme Court of your Church, and call its attention to the following Resolutions adopted by the General Council of the Alliance which met in Liverpool last June. They refer to the celebration of certain important anniversaries of Reformation events, which the Council considered should not be suffered to pass without suitable remembrance.

Liverpool, June 29th, 1904.

Inter alia: "The Business Committee having taken into consideration that the four hundredth anniversary of the birth of John Knox falls in 1905, that the three hundredth anniversary of the death of Theodore Beza falls in the same year, and that the four hundredth anniversary of the birth of Calvin falls in 1909, recommends that it be remitted to the Clerks to prepare a suitable Minute on the subject, to be embodied in the Minutes of Council, with a recommendation to the various Churches of the Alliance to commemorate events at suitable time (Proceedings of Council, p. 34).

Liverpool, July 4th, 1904.

Inter alia: "Rev. Dr. Roberts now submitted a report from a sub-committee suggesting the observance of certain anniversaries in connection with the Reformation.

"The attention of the Committee has been called to the observance by the Reformed and Lutheran Churches of the European Continent and elsewhere, of the first Sabbath of November as a day of special thanksgiving for the blessings resulting to so many Churches and countries from that great religious revival, which we call the Reformation of the Sixteenth Century.

"Such Commemorative Thanksgiving exercises your Committee regard as fitted to render most important service in our own day to the Reformed and Presbyterian Churches of the world. They would also form another link between the Churches of the European Continent and those located in other parts of the world.

"Your Committee would therefore recommend that the Council suggest the observance of such 'Reformation Day' by the different Churches of the Alliance, and would point out that the present is a most opportune season for arranging for such commemoration, since the birth of Knox is held to have occurred in 1505; the death of Theodore Beza, colleague and successor of Calvin, in 1605; and the birth of Calvin himself in 1509.

"All which is respectfully submitted.

"After some remarks by Professor Szabo, and by M. Ch. Merle d'Aubigne, the Report was accepted and adopted, on the understanding that the Churches might observe either the last Sabbath of October or the first Sabbath of November, as on the Continent the brethren themselves varied as to the day to be observed!" (Proceedings of Council, p. 180).

The Eastern Section of the Alliance understands that some Churches, especially in Great Britain, have already taken steps toward commemorative exercises in regard to John Knox during the year now opening; but in view of the danger that these may lead to merely local or individual action, it would respectfully urge that an agreement be come to in the interests of Reformed and Presbyterian Churches alike, among the different Church Committees as to a common date of celebration. It is desirable that so far as possible, the same Sabbath day be selected for sermons, in which the benefits of the Reformation and the part which John Knox had in obtaining

these for Scotland, shall be considered. The same week might be fixed on for public meetings, at which other aspects of his work could be fitly set forth. If this be not done, the National character of the Commemoration will be absent, and the moral impression of such a National honouring of the memory of the great Reformer will be in danger of being dissipation.

pated and in great measure lost.

Since the precise day and year of Knox's birth are uncertain, there is no obvious reason for the observance of one day more than another; but to permit of our kinsmen beyond the Atlantic and in the far distant Colonies of Great Britain, as well as our Continental neighbours (none of whose Churches will have this matter before their Assemblies till May or June of the present year), joining with us on this occasion, the date selected by the British Churches for a united observance would need to be late in the year. The Section therefore respectfully suggests that one or other of the Sabbath days mentioned in the Resolution of Council—either the last Sabbath of October or the first Sabbath of November—be chosen for this purpose. In this way we who are brethren in faith and polity would stand together the whole world over, as a United Church, in paying honour to the memory of one to whom we are all indebted.

Should this suggestion commend itself to your Church, the Executive Committee of the Alliance (Eastern Section) ventures to hope that the Committee, if any, already appointed by your Church, will place itself in early and friendly communication with those of sister Churches, with a view to a

simultaneous, and possibly also, a combined celebration.

(5.) FROM THE COLONIAL COMMITTEE OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

DEAR SIR,—The subject of granting commissions to ministers of the Church of Scotland who have gone abroad and who desire to connect themselves with Churches in the Colonies, has been under consideration by the Colonial Committee recently, and at their last meeting the following resolution was unanimously adopted, viz.:

"That in future no commission other than a special one be granted by the Committee, unless the Minister has been appointed directly to a charge by the Committee, or has been selected and sent out by them at the request

of one of the Colonial Churches.

I was instructed to send to each of the Colonial Churches a copy of this resolution, and to say that the Committee have been led to adopt it owing to the fact that in judging of the propriety of granting such commissions they were dependent to a great extent upon the report of others as to the unsuitability of the applicants. The Committee feel that a Presbyterial Certificate ought to be a sufficient guarantee of character and ministerial efficiency, and should certainly be preferable to one granted by them, as the Presbyteries are more likely to have fuller information. They wish the responsibility henceforth to rest upon the Presbyteries as the responsible court.

This resolution has been come to with a view to safeguard the interests of the Colonial Churches as well as of the Colonial Committee.

# (9.) THE OPINION OF THE LAW OFFICERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY RELATIVE TO THE DESIGNATION OF ASSEMBLIES.

The General Assembly of 1901 made the following remit to Presbyteries:

"'That wherever the word 'local' occurs in the Articles of Agreement, the word\_'State' be used.''

The returns to this remit showed that a majority of the Presbyteries approved, but as only one State Assembly had made a return, the General Assembly of 1903 resolved to "remit the overture to Presbyteries and State Assemblies in terms of Articles XIII."

The returns to this remit show that a majority both of the Presbyteries

and of State Assemblies approved of its terms.

In my opinion, therefore, the General Assembly of 1905 has power to alter the Articles of Agreement by substituting the word "State" for the word "local" wherever the latter occurs in connection with the designation of Assemblies.

The suggestions as to the best designations for the State Assemblies contained in certain of the returns are entirely outside the terms of the remit, but

do not in my opinion affect the validity of the returns.

## OVERTURES.

(1.) OVERTURE ON THE TRAINING OF HOME MISSION AGENTS WITH A VIEW TO ORDINATION,

From the State Assembly of Western Australia.

Whereas the supply of ministers is limited; whereas the Assembly employ, through their Home Mission Committee, a number of Lay Missionaries and Pastors, and have pledged themselves to offer some inducement to these and other young men desirous of study for the ministry; whereas it will tend to encourage and stimulate these Missionaries to prosecute their studies to offer them the prospect of entering the regular ministry: It is humbly overtured to the Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Western Australia, cited to meet in Perth on the 8th day of November, 1904, to take these premises into consideration and send the following recommendations as an overture to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Australia:—

1. That the Lay Missionaries and Pastors be encouraged to study for

the ministry; and that those who intimate their desire to study with a view to

ordination undergo a course of training extending over six years.

2. That the Home Mission Committee be empowered to supervise and direct the studies of the students, in co-operation with and in accordance with a course approved by the College Committee of the Presbyterian Church of Australia.

3. That the course of study include: Scripture, English Literature, Christian Ethics and Evidences, New Testament Greek, Theology, Church His-

tory, and Practical Training.

4. That each student be examined annually in the prescribed subjects and text-books; his year of study to be regarded as one of the six years of the course, only on condition of his reaching an efficiency which satisfies the Home Mission Committee.

5. That at the close of the six years' study, providing the student has continuously and satisfactorily served the Home Mission Committee, and passed the necessary examinations, the missionary be ordained to the ministry.

## (4.) OVERTURE ON TRAINING OF HOME MISSIONARIES.

This was seconded by Mr. G. Kerr, and agreed to.

#### COURSE PRESCRIBED FOR FIRST YEAR.

English Grammar; Composition, selected pieces; an Old Testament Study and a New Testament Study; Salmond's Handbook or Shorter Catechism, Part 1; Sermon Preparation; Reading of Scripture and Delivery of Sermons.

#### REPORT ON ABOVE COURSE.

Your Committee have to report that last August arrangements were made whereby a fortnight's instruction was given to Missionaries entering on the course prescribed by the Assembly of 1904. Four Missionaries, namely, Messrs. L. Donaldson, A. Jessop, J. Palamountain, and E. W. Walker, at tended the classes. Instruction in New Testament study. Catechism, and Sermon Preparation was given by Rev. F. E. Oxer, M.A., D.D. Instruction in Old Testament study, English, and Sermon Delivery was given by Rev. A. R. Osborn, M.A. . . . Examination tests have since been given to Messrs. A. Jessop and A. E. Walker; Mr. Palamountain has relinquished work in our Church; Mr. Donaldson has been suffering from eye trouble. We recommend that the Assembly should consider him, as well as Messrs. Jessop and Walker, as having completed one year of the Mission Course.

#### DELIVERANCE.

The Assembly adopt the report, and thank Revs. A. R. Osborn and F. E. Oxer, Messrs. A. J. Hawkins and D. Inglis, and all those who assisted during the Missionaries' stay in Launceston. Accept Messrs. Donaldson, Jessop, and Walker as having completed one year of the Mission Course, and take such steps as may be needful to secure recognition of this work by the Presbyterian Church of Australia. Approve Syllabus for 1905.

## PETITIONS.

(1.) PETITION OF MR. A. M. OGILVIE TO BE TAKEN ON TRIALS FOR LICENSE.

To the College Committee of the Presbyterian Church of Australia.

The Humble Petition of Archibald Macfarlane Ogilvie, of Manilla, in the State of New South Wales, respectfully sheweth:—

1. That your Petitioner is, and has been for two and a half years, engaged as an Agent on behalf of the Home Missions Committee of the Presbyterian Church in New South Wales, and is at present in charge of the Home Missions Parish of Manilla.

2. That he was educated in Scotland, and was in course of training for the Ministry when he was compelled to leave Scotland in search of health.

3. That before leaving Scotland he laboured for five years in connection with the Students' Settlement in Glasgow. During the first three years he acted as Assistant Missionary, and during the last two years as Missionary. He also had charge for two years of a large Mission in connection with the Caledonia Road United Free Church, Glasgow.

4. That after coming to New South Wales he acted as Assistant to Rev. James Kinghorn at Bathurst for nineteen months, and afterwards had charge of Warren Parish for three months until July, 1904, when his services were specially requisitioned for the difficult post of huilding up the Home Missions Parish of Manilla. He still continues to labour at Manilla, and the result of his work is shown in the letter of the Secretary of the Church at Manilla, which is attached.

5. That he has received a good education, possesses a fair knowledge of

Latin, and is now studying Greek.

6. That at the time of the breakdown in his health he was a Student of Glasgow University, and attended classes in the following subjects:—Moral Philosophy, English Literature, Political Economy, Logic, including Psychology and Metaphysics.

7. That he is unable to complete the ordinary students' course, because the only Universities in Australia are situated near the sea-coast, and his health is such that he cannot remain for more than a few days near the sea,

although he enjoys good health in a dry climate.

8. That he desires to enter the ministry of the Presbyterian Church of Australia, and to labour for the Church in the inland centres, where a dry climate is to be found.

Your petitioner therefore prays that he may be admitted and ordained as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church of Australia, either with or without further examination.

And your petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Your petitioner wishes to inform you that he did not sit the Entrance Examination to the Divinity Hall for the following reasons:—That he was Assistant Missionary in the Kinning Park U.F. Church under the Rev. Arch. Russell, M.A., and that owing to Mr. Russell taking his holidays a month later than usual (July), he had the whole responsibility of the Unigregation of about 800 members in regards to visiting and supplying of pulpits for six weeks; also that he had to do the ordinary work of the Mission as well as weeks; also, that he had to do the ordinary work of the Mission, as well as the above. These duties left no time for classical studies.

On entering the Hall your petitioner was informed that his attendance of the classes would be allowed to count on condition that he passed the Entrance Examination in the following year. As he received appointment from the Home Mission Committee of the Presbyterian Church of New South Wales, when the first session expired he was unable to sit the Entrance Examination, which would not take place till six months after he left Glas-

gow to come to Australia.

Your petitioner has been allowed to sit the Entrance Examination here

Up to the year 1874 practical engineering and theoretical studies were pursued under Admiralty supervision at the Royal Naval Dockyard and College. In May, 1874, I won a scholarship in the Science and Art Department for General Proficiency, securing highest marks in seven subjects. In June, 1874, the South Kensington Art Examinations were passed and valuable prizes secured. In July, 1874, the examinations for entry into the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, were passed, and 12 months' residence and studies entered upon. In the June, 1875, examinations I was successful in winning one of the three Honour Certificates. On the 9th August, 1875, I received my commission as an officer in H.M. Navy, and was appointed to H.M.S. "Sapphire." The years 1875 to 1879 were spent on the Australian Station, and experiences gained of the several States, of Tasmania, of New Zealand, and of the South Sea Islands, have greatly helped my ministry. During these voyagings I did a good deal of Christian work, and colonial friends appreciated these labours in a very practical manner. They gave me £600 to enable me to resign my commission, and to enter upon a College Course for the Ministry. At the Western College, Plymouth, the years 1878 to 1882 were spent as a Theological Student. After passing the final examinations I was ordained by Dr. Chapman, Prof. Anthony, and the Rev. C. Wilson, M.A., and a Church at Stonehurst placed under my care. Four years of arduous but successful Ministry followed. A new Church and School were built, and every penny of the £2300 raised. In the midst of our joys a call from New South Wales greeted me, and on the 30th October, 1886, Plymouth was left for Parramatta. From 1886 to 1904 the Congregational Churches at Parramatta, South Melbourne, and Fremantle have been the scenes of my labours, and th

More I cannot say. My brethren here and elsewhere are willing to testify of my life and Ministry, and of the great help rendered by my wife and family in strengthening all endeavours for Christian life and work. Never

did the Presbyterian Church in West Australia stand more in need of experienced Ministers of Christ than now, and the growing importance of this vast State only serves to emphasise this need that must be seen to be understood.

(12.) THE PETITION OF MR. JOHN F. SIMS TO BECOME A THEOLOGICAL STUDENT.

To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Australia.

The Petition of John Frederick Sims humbly sheweth:-

1. That your petitioner is a Home Mission Agent in the employment of the Home Mission Committee of the Presbyterian Church of Victoria, and has been thus employed for the last five and a half years—for the first two years and a half under the supervision of the Presbytery of Gippsland, the Rev. Robert Mitchell, of Rosedale, being his Moderator, and since that within the bounds of the Presbyteries of Maryborough and the Wimmera, the Revs. H. T. Hull and Geo. B. Murphy supervising his work.

2. That before taking up work as a Home Mission Agent your petitioner spent two years at Angas College, Adelaide, the Rev. Lockhart Morton's Training Institution for workers in the Home and Foreign Field, where, under the Rev. D. M. Berry, M.A., and other teachers, he studied various branches of Theology, English, Greek, and Homiletics, and received a prac-

tical training in Christian work.

3. That your petitioner presented himself at the Melbourne University Matriculation Examination last May, and passed in Greek, English, and Arithmetic, but failed to get a sufficient percentage in his other subjects—Hisory, Latin, and Algebra—to secure a pass, being handicapped by the fact that most of his work has been done in districts where it is impossible to get help in preparing for University Examinations.

4. That your petitioner now asks that your Venerable Court will permit him to present himself for the Entrance Examination in the Theological Hall of Ormond College next February, with the understanding that he will also present himself at the next Matriculation Examination and do his utmost to

pass.

5. That your petitioner has done work that his Moderators have been good enough to speak well of, and thinks that his training at Angas College, his almost six years' service of the Home Mission Committee in various parts of Victoria, and the fact that he has already passed Matriculation Examination in Greek and English, should induce your Venerable Court to permit him at this stage to present himself for the Ormond Entrance Examination.

6. That your petitioner was not aware of the existence of the June Classes for Missionaries until he had been in Victoria some considerable time, and was not informed that it was necessary to attend them. He feels that under all the circumstances his Petition might well be granted.

And your petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

I ceased work three years ago, and last year matriculated in seven subjects—namely, Latin, Greek, English, French, Euclid, Algebra, Arithmetic. I proceeded to Ormond College and University to do first year B.A., with the object of doing Philosophy next year. I do not think that I will be successful. Should my anticipation prove correct. I desire your permission to go on to do a course of Philosophy next year and then sit for entrance to Hall in 1907. I am aware that a pass in first year Greek and Latin qualifies for to sit for the Hall examination, but I consider that it

would be a waste of time and money to sudy the same work again, and that more knowledge would be acquired by an introduction to different work. Hoping that my petition may receive your approval,—I am, yours respectfully, WILLIAM BETT.

I enquired from the classical master of Ormond re my attainments in Latin, and Greek, and he informed me that I had a fair chance of passing, but would not say I would pass for certain.

#### (17.) PETITION OF MR. F. L. A. SCHLOEFFEL TO SIT FOR ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Unto the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Australia.

The Petition of the undersigned humbly showeth :-

1. That your Petitioner was born at Dubbo in 1875, and obtained his primary education in the Superior School of Dubbo, and in the Grammar School of Dubbo.

2. That for several years he was actively connected with the Presbyterian

Congregation of Dubbo.

3. That being desirous of entering the Presbyterian Ministry he passed the Matriculation Examination in Sydney University in 1900, taking Greek as one of the subjects, and attended all the classes and lectures prescribed for the first year of Arts in 1903, and in the examination passed in Science, but failed in Classics and Mathematics.

REFERENCE ANENT THE INDUCTION OF THE REV. R. A. REDMOND TO LEURA AND WENTWORTH FALLS.

It is hereby certified in the name and by the authority of the General Assembly in the State of New South Wales, that on the 16th day of May, 1905, the said Assembly resolved to transmit the following report to the General Assembly of Australia:-

The Report of the Presbytery of the Hawkesbury in the matter of the Settlement of the Rev. R. A. Redmond, B.A., at Lenra and Wentworth Falls.

On the 14th day of December, 1994, a petition-from Leura and Wentworth Falls, asking for moderation in a Call, was presented to the Presbytery. The prayer of the petition was granted, and the Rev. J. McKee was appointed to moderate on the first day of January, 1905. On the 11th day of January, the ediet of moderation, duly served, was laid on the table of the Presbytery, together with a Call in favour of the Rev. Robert Alexander Redmond, B.A., signed by 92 persons. The Call was sustained, but as Mr. Redmond's Presbyterian Certificate was not before the Court, it was resolved to deal with the Call at an adjourned meeting, and the Clerk was instructed to write to Mr. Redmond, intimating that the Presbytery had been adjourned to afford him an opportunity of sending forward his certificate. On the 23rd of January the Call was again taken up, when the Rev. I. Steel moved, and the Rev. R. Edgar seconded that the induction be praceeded with in the absence of documentary evidence, and that the whole matter be reported to the General Assembly of Australia, which, after discussion, was carried by a majority. From this decision the Rev. H. Wilson dissented. On the 8th of February, the Presbytery inet at Leura, and inducted Mr. Redmond into the Pastoral Charge of Leura and Wentworth Falls.

That Mr. Redmond be recommended to petition the General Assembly of Australia in accordance with the Regulations (Section B) for the Reception of Ministers.

## REPORTS.

I.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS, 1905.

The Board of Missions, in presenting its report and balance-sheet to the Assembly, desires to express gratitude to Almighty God for the success which has attended the labours of the Missionaries since last Assembly. It submits also the reports and audited balance sheets of the several State Churches.

#### THE MISSIONS' AGENT.

The Board places on record its keen sense of the loss sustained by the whole Church in the enforced retirement, through ill-health, of the Rev. F. H. L. Paton, the Missions Agent.

Mr. Paton entered on his work with characteristic enthusiasm, and brought into it that fine Christian spirit and missionary zeal which mark his whole family. When he was unanimously appointed by the Assembly, it was felt that a new era had commenced in our Foreign Mission Work. His visits were hailed with great pleasure in all the States, and a new impulse was given by his stirring missionary addresses.

His work went on most hopefully for a time, but in the providence of God he was forced to retire in June, 1904, and while the Board felt, and feel now, the necessity of such an Agent, as well to stimulate zeal as to form a bond of union amongst the State Churches, still in view of the expense entailed, and after consulting with the Foreign Mission Committees of the various States, it was resolved that the matter should remain over till the meeting of the Assembly. At the same time, the Board is of opinion that if the Assembly is to prosecute Foreign Missions with vigour, and if the people are to be aroused to a sense of their duty in this respect, an Agent is necessary.

The Board is pleased to be able to inform the Assembly that Mr. Paton's health has been so far restored that he has felt strong enough to undertake the work of a settled pastorate.

## NORTH QUEENSLAND.

The work at the different stations has gone on very satisfactorily since the last meeting of the Assembly. The Rev. N. and Mrs. Hey returned from their visit to Europe early in 1904, greatly benefited in health, and prepared to take up their work with renewed energy.

Mr. Hey found a great many things needing attention at Mapoon, and till recently his whole time was taken up at his own station. The last letter received from him was written on the eve of his departure to visit Mr. Brown and Mr. Richter at their stations. The report of his own station is most satisfactory.

Rev. E. Brown, finding that his old church was no longer fit to use, set about building another, and made an appeal to friends in the different States for help. The Women's Missionary Union in Victoria responded very liberally, and although no report has been received by the Executive, it is presumed that the ladies in the other States have also responded, and that the church is now completed.

Rev. A. and Mrs. Richter have settled at the Archer River, and are now fully engaged in meeting and overcoming the difficulties incident to a new station. The influence gained by Mr. Hey, and the help which can be rendered by the aborigines trained in building by him, make the initial expenses of settlement much less than formerly.

As usual, the Queensland Government has treated the Mission with great generosity, both in the matter of reserves and in practical help for building, and the Board would again request the Assembly to express its indebtedness to the Government.

In consequence of the evils attending the recruiting of natives, the Government of Queensland directed that all recruiting at our stations should cease after the 31st of July, 1904, and the best results are anticipated from the new regulation. A difficulty has arisen, however, from the fact that many of the young men had become attached to boating through their engagement with the pearl fishers. To meet this, Mr. Hey has purchased a small cutter for their exclusive use. The arrangement is that those who are in charge of the boat may carry stores for cattle and telegraph stations, payment for which would later on enable them to discharge their liability to Mr. Hey. In the meantime, the natives are permitted to use the boat for fishing purposes, the fish taken to be used exclusively for food. The matter has been reported to Dr. Roth, who heartily approves of Mr. Hey's action.

#### FUTURE OPERATIONS.

The Board is strongly of opinion that the United Church should take up some additional Foreign Mission work. A strong appeal was made by the New Hebrides Synod last year. A medical missionary is very much needed at Fila, and the Synod pleaded with the General Assembly to make an appointment. The matter was submitted to the several State Committees, but nothing definite has been done. It is hoped that the Assembly will consider the request very favourably, and arrange for the appointment of a missionary. The French are specially active just now, and if we are to hold our own, attention must be given to this at once. While acknowledging with gratitude what the Government has done in subsidizing the maritime service, the Board is of opinion that it should be urged to foster in every possible way the interests of Australian settlers, by the remission of duties and by offering further inducements to settle in the islands. In view of the large expenditure of life and money which the Presbyterian Church has made for over forty years in the Group, and in view also of the proximity of the Islands to the Australian continent, it is necessary that strong measures should be taken either to annex them or to secure their perpetual independence.

#### FINANCE.

A reference to the balance-sheet appended shows that since last meeting of Assembly there has been an expenditure under current account of £1778 9s 11d. The Board commenced the period with a liability of £226 14s. 1d. This, unfortunately, has been increased to £313 13s. 3d., but there are certain sums to be received which will reduce this to £246 15s. 9d. There has, however, to be added to this a sum of £200 in round figures, which is owing to the Moravian Board for the passage and outfit of Mr. and Mrs. Richter, and for payment to that Board's Beneficiary Funds on behalf of the three Missionaries.

It is most desirable that this liability should be removed, and the Treasurer suggests that it should be paid by the various States on the basis of membership, and that the payments should be allowed to extend over two years. He suggests also that in future the amount required to meet salaries and ordinary expenses should be assessed on the same basis.

Before closing this report, the Board desires to call the attention of this Assembly to the loss which has been sustained by the Foreign Mission in the lamented death of Mrs. J. G. Paton and Mrs. F. J. Paton, and the enforced retirement, of Rev. R. Fraser through ill-health, and of Dr. McCausland through the illness of his wife, and would suggest that letters of sympathy be sent to those friends who have been bereaved and afflicted.

REPORT OF MISSIONS' AGENT-SEPTEMBER, 1903-JUNE, 1904.

The Manse, Dunolly, August 9th, 1905.

The latter part of 1903 was spent in visiting congregations in the Presbyteries of Mortlake, Gippsland, and Melbourne, in the State of Victoria. During that time a Conference on Missions was held in Melbourne, when representatives from New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, and Tasmania

took part. The object of the Conference was to draw the State Committees into closer line as regards Foreign Missionary organisation among the home Churches. Nothing very definite resulted.

The month of January, 1905, was devoted to the preparation of a course of lectures on Modern Missions. These lectures were afterwards delivered to the Theological Students in Ormond College, Melbourne, and St. Andrew's College, Sydney.

February and part of March were spent in visiting congregations in Victorian Presbyteries, and then the Missions Agent proceeded to Sydney, and thence to the Clarence, Richmond, and Tweed Rivers. There, despite abnormal rains, most of the meetings were well attended, and only one or two lapsed owing to flooded creeks and impassable roads.

In all these tours the usual method was followed of preaching three times on Sunday and conducting a lantern lecture each week evening except Saturday. Blank promise slips were also distributed at each week evening meeting, and many promises of regular weekly contributions were received in this way. Also a good deal of missionary information was disseminated in a memorable way through the pictures thrown on the screen. The ministers heartily carried out the arrangements made by the State Conveners, and everywhere the Missions Agent received the greatest possible kindness and hospitality. ....

Various matters appeared to the Foreign Missions Agent to require the consideration of the General Assembly, and especially the following:—

- (a) The bringing into line of the various State methods of organising the home field for Foreign Mission work, so that there might be one common Missionary organisation for the Commonwealth.
- (b) The organising of the men as well as the women of our Church for prayer, study, and giving in regard to our Foreign Mission work.
  - (c) The wider dissemination of missionary news and literature.
- (d) The more effective organisation of the Sabbath School forces for Foreign Missionary work.

Unfortunately, a very serious break-down in health occurred at the end of the Tweed River tour, and most of the meetings arranged in Sydney and other parts had to be cancelled. The Convener and all concerned extended the most kindly sympathy and consideration. As soon as able to travel, the Foreign Missions Agent returned to Melbourne, and as a result of urgent medical advice he was compelled very reluctantly and sorrowfully to hand in his resignation. This was accepted by the Board, to take effect from the end of June, 1904. In closing this brief report the Foreign Missions Agent would very heartily thank the Convener of the Board, the State Conveners, and the many ministers and friends who showed him so much kindness during his term of office.

REPORT OF WEIPA MISSION STATION FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30TH, 1905.

Written for the Queensland Presbyterian Committee,

1. Population. — Owing to the action of the Government in suddenly reducing the amount of our grant by nearly a half for the past year, and our consequent inability to supply our people with food but to a very limited extent, we have had but few residents during the year under review compared with other years. Again and again the people have come in and wanted work, but, excepting to a very few, our answer has had to be that we could not give them for want of food to pay them with. The great pity of this is not so much that work which we wished to do has had to be left undone, but that we are practically out of touch with our people, they being in the bush and we tied to the station.

On a few special occasions large numbers have been in for a short stay, coming, I fear, with only a thought for the meat that perisheth, and soon forgetting what little they hear of higher things. This almost entire separation from our people causes us to deplore the above-mentioned action of the

Government, the more so that the Church cannot see its way clear to appoint two Missionaries (as suggested in my last year's report) so that we might itinerate amongst the people in their native haunts.

II. Spiritual.—The machinery for this part has gone on working smoothly. All the services have been maintained—two on Sunday and a short service every morning, with an evening service on Wednesday. These are not attended oftentimes as well as they might be, for many of the blacks, like many of their white brothers and sisters, would come to Church readily enough if any temporal gain could be acquired thereby, but do not see the force of attending when there is not.

In our little Church there has been a loss and a gain. One woman, who was baptised earlier in the year, died in November. On Easter Sunday two young men and a lad were baptised, thus bringing our total up to seven. Another young man was being prepared for baptism, but an old woman (almost old enough to be his grandmother) took a fancy to marry him, and although for some time he stoutly stood firm, at last he gave way under pressure of her persistency and the urgings of some of the old men, and was led astray for awhile, but soon repented and turned again from the evil. Sometimes our people strangely blend the old and the new, shewing that the new is gaining some influence, e.g., a man died away in the bush lately, and for a few weeks the usual corrobborees were held over the corpse; then the friends came for a shovel to dig a grave, and at the burial two of the men present engaged in prayer! May the Lord more fully send out His light and His truth, and lead them into the way of Life!

On June 29th our new Church was opened. The writer and Mrs. Brown spent that day (and many others) in the grip of dengue fever. But Mr. Hey and Mr. Richter, who had come to rejoice with us in our rejoicing, kindly did what was necessary ministerially. For the occasion the children had learnt a portion of Solomon's dedication prayer, which they, kneeling, used in the service as a prayer. Then they had also learnt and sang hymn No. 516 in Church Praise, some taking the treble and some the alto. This they did also in an anthem, in which some of the young men sang the tenor and others the bass. By some friends it was thought impossible to get them to sing the four parts, but they sang very well indeed. Mr. Hey had brought with him the male members of the Mapoon Brass Band, and in the services, as well as during other parts of the day, they enlivened the proceedings with their music, which was quite a novelty to our people. We trust that the new building may be owned by God as His House, so that very many souls may therein be brought out of the darkness into the light of the Gospel.

III. Medical.—Not much special calls for mention under this heading. Day by day throughout the year there has been some attendance (sometimes many, sometimes few) at the dispensary for treatment for the various ailments that flesh is heir to, some even seeking a cure for old age. In October whooping-cough took hold of most of the children, and in this connection the (in some places) much-lauded theory of leaving them alone to their own treatment was again shewn to be faulty, for whilst three children in the camp died from it, all those under our care recovered.

IV. Educational: 1. Children's (a) Day School.—This branch of the work has pursued the even tenor of its way, and Miss Schick hopes and believes that progress has been made. But as no official inspection has been made for over three years, no authoritative statement can be made to that effect. Unofficial visits were made at different times by H. Milman, Esq., of Thursday Island, and Sub-Inspector Garraway, of Coen, and both complimented the teacher on the accomplishment of her pupils, though neither saw more than what they could do in the three R's. When the corner-stones of our new Church were laid in August, the children, under their teacher's leadership, gave a capital little entertainment, consisting of songs, recitations, a round, and pole drill. Then for the several Church festivals of the year they learnt and repeated suitable portions of Scripture and sang special hymns, e.g., for Palm Sunday they learnt the Hosanna anthem, girls and boys taking their respective parts.

(b) Sunday School. — The results from this cannot be so well tabulated, but we trust the result is similar to the case of the old Scotch woman who

compared her Sunday sermon hearing to the action of the sun in bleaching her linen, no definite result to be ascribed to any one day, but nevertheless the effect was certain.

- 2. Adults. The three members of the staff have continued their several classes for men and women. During several months the young men on two or three evenings of the week practised singing, specially with a view of shewing what they could do in this line at Church-opening, and, as mentioned under heading "2," they acquitted themselves splendidly.
- . Manual Labour. Owing to the reduction of the Government grant, many works of improvement have had to be neglected. But our gardens, being our chief source of food supply, could not be. The principal work has been the building of a new church, 50ft. by 26ft. inside. The walls are made of Pise and the roof covered with Ruberoid. The gables could not be made of Pise, as owing to the nearness of the wet season by the time the walls were done, we had to rush on the roof as soon as possible, and for the wet season cover the gables temporarily with galvanised iron. To be able to season cover the gables temporarily with galvanised iron. To be able to build up the gables we had to start new industry, viz., brickmaking, and though the first attempts were poor, a few of the men are now able to do tolerably well at it. In October a change of assistants was effected. Tom Collope left us, and went to be assistant to Mr. Richter at the Archer River, Tom Coland A. Richter, who was formerly with us for two and a half years, returned to take up his old position. For us a Kanaka is only a makeshift, a white man being an absolute necessity. A married white man would be far better still, but, unfortunately, the salary we can offer will not, I am afraid, tempt a married white man in North Queensland.
- VI. Visitors.—An unexpected and unofficial visit was received on May 7th from H. Milman, Esq., Government Resident at Thursday Island. He went over the station, enquired fairly fully into all the affairs of the station, and spent a short time in the school. The latter would have been prolonged, spent a short time in the school. The latter would have been prolonged, only that his stay here was unavoidably very brief. Sub-Inspector Garraway, of Coen, visited us twice to see that all was going on well, and Sergeant Whiteford, also of Coen, came once for the same reason. Again we have been disappointed at receiving no visit from the Official Inspector, Dr. Roth. Though somewhat out of the world, we are not entirely cut off from communication therewith. During the year we received ten visits from the "J. G. Ward," and two from the "Minnie."

WII. Gifts.—As usual, in July and December, we received practical and most useful expressions of sympathy from kind friends in the South in the shape of boxes of clothing, etc. Without these I hardly know how we could get on, as we could not afford to buy clothes for our large family. Then several kind friends in the South kindly sent us donations toward our new Church. Some congregations, Young People's Bands, and Sunday Schools have assisted us more by adopting some of our children. But what was most of all prized by our people, as long as it lasted, was a gift of two bullocks from our neighbour, Mr. Shadforth, of York Downs, for the Church opening day. That was the crowning event of the year to them. That was the crowning event of the year to them.

In closing, we would express our thanks to all who have been our helpers, especially to Him who is the help of all the needy, for such are we and our people, and we have greatly and thankfully experienced His Divine aid and support.

REPORT OF MAPOON REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL HOME.

To the Under-Secretary, Home Secretary's Department.

July 1st, 1905.

Sir,-I have the honour to forward you my Annual Report of the condition of the inmates in the Reformatory and Industrial School under my care.

As will be seen in the monthly returns, 22 half-caste children have been sentenced under various dates from 1901 up to the present time to the Mapoon Reformatory.

Considering the many nationalities these children partly represent, and the degrading and demoralizing environments they have been rescued from, it is surprising how soon under proper management and more congenial conditions they will submit to discipline as a matter of course.

It is, however, very desirable that these children should be sent to the respective Reformatories at an early age, in order that all their former associations are entirely ablitrated from their minds.

ciations are entirely obliterated from their minds.

No trouble has been experienced in the management of these children, and all have without exception greatly improved in every respect.

All the inmates of the Reformatory have attended the Mapoon School with the other half-caste and full-blooded black children, both morning and afternoon, and have made more or less fair progress.

Much trouble is taken to train these children as far as possible into useful citizens. The boys receive instruction in carpentering, gardening, and cattle training, the bigger ones also in the management of sailing boats. The girls, besides learning housework and sewing, have to prepare their own gardens, and the vegetables and fruits thus realised were used mostly for the children themselves.

The health of the children has been all that could be desired, with the exception that during the first month of the year an epidemic of whooping-cough visited our home, but has not proved fatal to any of the inmates, although some of the black children in the native camps succumbed to it. Great care has been taken of the moral safety of the girls. The gardens, houses, and even playgrounds are fenced in with netting wire, and social habits and mutual improvement among themselves has been cultivated, with very gratifying results.

very gratifying results.

So far none of the girls are of a marriageable age, but the time will soon come, and I think it is hardly fair to get them mated to full-blooded blacks, who as a rule are not able to provide for them. To hire them out for

service is not at all desirable, for many reasons.

The small allowance of 2s. 6d. per week for each child has been of the greatest use to us; indeed, we found it sometimes difficult to make ends meet.—I have the honour to be, Sir,

REPORT OF THE ABORIGINAL MISSION STATION AT THE ARCHER RIVER, 1904-05.

July, 1905.

Dear Sir,—It is now eleven months since I made the commencement at the Archer River, and I may gladly state that, like a red line through black writing, God's blessing and mercy can be seen through all the difficulties and trials, joy and sorrow, hope and disappointment, sickness, dangers, etc., which we met. This gave us comfort in all our insufficiency, and we trust and pray that His blessing may work a greater success during the next year, especially in spiritual matters.

The mission-house is not quite finished, though I had a very able man, Peter Bee, who would have finished everything until November, had he not been kept back so much in his work by the want of tools. It was not until August that I received news about making use of the Government rationmoney, and the tools, ordered after this time, did not arrive before the end of October. So most of the work was done without the proper tools, which took him double the time. The fact that he had to work under these circumstances made him leave it before it was finished. His successor, Tom, is not much of a carpenter, but he is very good for garden and other outdoor work. So I do occasionally some work at the house, as much as the time allows me. Of course, it will take years now, before everything will be completely done, as so much other work presses.

For the Assistant a bark house is made on high piles. This gives him a simple, but healthy, living. The old Assistant-house, enlarged and furnished with rough benches, serves for the time being as school and Church. As soon as the fences around the premises are finished, I will build a girls' dormitory. Till now the children are sleeping in the camp with their parents.

The school-work, started after Christmas, made a fair progress until April. This is the time when the rainy season is past, and all people begin their endless wanderings, taking their children with them. The whole attendance was about 60, but since April we had only about ten and less a day. Still, we kept school, except sickness prevented it. A great hindrance was the want of means of instruction, which the Government is supposed to send us. I have asked for, and hope to get them soon. We helped ourselves as

well as we could with a self-made alphabet-card and blackboard.

The spiritual work is mostly done by explaining Bible pictures twice on Sunday and once a week-day evening. Every work-day morning I speak a few words about a Bible passage, taken from a text-book. On Monday evening singing-class is held. They do not yet show much interest in the salvation of their souls. The men are interested in horses, cows, boats, etc., if they see some on the pictures, but the women don't show any interest at all. The Spirit of God has a hard work here, but we hope He will conquer the hearts of many. In the singing-class they show great ability, as they learn a tune very quickly, long before they are able to speak the words. The pastoral work, the most important of all, is not flourishing yet, for different reasons, but I seek a chance, and occasionally I find some to speak to one personally by himself.

There is a great work waiting for me. This is to find out which of the nine or ten dialects I have to deal with I might have to learn. I started one when I was still at Mapoon, but coming here I found that this dialect is spoken by four persons only. So I gave it up. I would like to catch one of the southern dialects, but the people are so very wild that I cannot get a man to stay with me a few weeks or months. They come here, work a few days, and go away. Now, the northern people, who are a little more civilised, do not understand the southern tribes. So I have decided at present to go on with the study of that almost dead language until I find another chance. I am sure I can expect more success, as soon as I am able to speak native languages.

A great difficulty I have to meet in financial way. The fact is that I have nothing received of the Government ration account since New Year. This amounts for the past six months to £75. I paid the stores from my private money. Though I was told I might have an assistant from the beginning, I never yet received any money as his salary. This is to the end of June eleven months (£55). Would you be so kind as to make some arrangements that it soon might be sent on to the Bank? Will you excuse my asking for it, but I am really in need? As I have paid all of my own, and have received no salary for myself since New Year, except £25, there is nothing more in the Bank left. I have already asked Mr. Hey to pay my Assistant's salary for the time being. I am unable to pay any bill now in Thursday Island, neither private nor natives, and this is a painful state for a Missionary to be in debt with enemies of the Mission work. About my private affairs, I will get in order with Mr. Pryde, but I would be very much obliged to you if you kindly would forward the £130 (£75 and £55) as soon as possible. Writing about money, I have also to mention the bath and stove which I was told to buy in Thursday Island. Mrs. Richter brought most of the things from Brisbane, where she got them much cheaper than in Thursday Island. I am copying a list of expenses here:—Stove, £5; pipe (chimney), £1 11s.; bath, £1; flat iron, 17s. 6d.; shower-bath, 10s.; freight and wharfage, 17s.; total, £9 15s. 6d.

As to the Government ration account, I venture to ask whether you would be so kind (if it is possible) to forward it quarterly in advance. It would be a great advantage, for if I pay the stores cash, as I have done it now, I will get 2½ per cent. discount. If I want to get the discount, and the ration-money is paid afterwards, I have to pay of my own for the time being, and there will be a constant paying and repaying into the Bank. A statement expenses I have sent to the Chief Protector.

Concerning ourselves, I have to state thankfully that we both escaped the dengue fever, and trust we will not be caught now; but we did not escape sickness altogether. As our rooms were not finished when the rainy season set in, we were too much exposed to the wet, and Mrs. Richter caught some rheumatism. Malaria also has visited us both, and especially Mrs. Richter had very heavy attacks, which robbed her of all her strength. Of course, we expected it at a new place like this. Mr. Hey, after his visit bere, took Mrs. Richter to Mapoon for a few weeks, and I hope that the change will have

freed her of the fever. A very heavy case of dengue has thrown a South Sea Islander down, who came here for a few weeks to help me in the work. He was laid up a fortnight, and then he died—I think, of heart—affection. (This is not my assistant).

The place here we consider to be very healthy, 12 feet above high-water mark, and the house is built on 6½ft. piles. It is now especially dry here, but the ground is good and fertile, and we hope that after some strong labour we will have a better crop next year than the year past.

## APPENDIX.

#### NEW SOUTH WALES.

#### REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS FOR 1904.

Your Committee is pleased to report another successful and encouraging year of Foreign Mission work. The awakened interest in the work generally throughout the Church, mentioned in last year's Report, has been well maintained; and what has been accomplished calls forth our deepest gratitude to Almighty God.

#### THE NEW HEBRIDES.

Missionaries - Malo and Tutuba: Mr. D. L. Paterson and Mrs. Paterson. The work is progressing with general satisfaction and the health of the Missionaries and the natives during the year has been excellent, though the season has been somewhat trying owing to the unusually heavy and continuous rains.

A new boat has been obtained and sent to Mr. Paterson, and he reports that it is admirably suited for his work. The old boat has been sold, and

the proceeds used in part payment of the new one.

Rev. J. D. Landels has completed the translation of certain portions of the Scriptures into Maloese, and the British and Foreign Bible Society has

generously undertaken the cost of printing and publishing the same.

Mr. W. S. Park has again shown his deep interest in Mission work, and

all that pertains to its maintenance, by superintending the sale of arrowroot prepared by the natives in the Mission.

The Committee has found it necessary to revert to the Christmas Collecting Cards. The form of the Card has been slightly altered, owing to there being now no "Dayspring."

The amount raised by the Cards this year has been fairly satisfactory; but it is considered that, with a more complete and systematic organisation in the various parishes a much larger sum would and systematic organisation in the various parishes, a much larger sum would be obtained.

The Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church of Australia has approved of the proposal to appoint a Medical Missionary to Vila, in the Island of Efate, and has asked your Committee for counsel and assistance in the matter. In view, however, of the state of the funds, and liabilities already incurred, it has been found necessary to decline any further financial responsibilities at present. Vila is the commercial centre of the New Hebrides, sibilities at present. Vila is the commercial centre of the New Hebrides, and numbers of English and French settlers reside there.

The political state of the New Hebrides is, at the present time, anything but satisfactory, owing to active French aggression. Your Committee made a strong representation to the Commonwealth Home Secretary regarding the matter, and was assured that everything would be done to secure dominant British interests there. Your Committee feels strongly that the Church needs to watch this matter very closely.

## CHINESE MISSIONS.

Missimaries. - Sydney: Rev. John Young Wai; Newcastle, Mr. James Kem Yee.

The work at Sydney continues to prosper. At Newcastle it is exceedingly hopeful and encouraging.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The income has not only covered the expenditure, but at the present time there is a credit balance. This happy result is the outcome of an increasing interest in Foreign Mission work throughout the Church, the very liberal contributions of the Women's Missionary Association, and a sum of £40 10s. received from the Chinese Church at Foster-street, in aid of the salary of Rev. J. Young Wai.

The Committee is again glad to report the receipt of £5 5s. from his Excellency Sir Harry Rawson and Lady Rawson towards our Foreign Mission work.

Your Committee cannot close its Report without expressing its heartiest appreciation and thankfulness for the help rendered by individual congrega-tions, the Women's Missionary Association, and others who have come to its help during the year; and trusts that past blessings and success will encourage each and all in their future efforts, so that we shall not only fully maintain our present Missionary services, but also open up new and promising fields that are awaiting us.

#### THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

Missionaries.—Sholinghur, India: Miss McLean, Miss McNeill, M.P.S., and Miss Symonds, B.A.

Miss McLean was with us during the earlier portion of the year, and visited many of our Congregations. Her addresses were very interesting and instructive, and have done much to awaken a deeper interest in Foreign Missions. Miss McLean has returned to her work in India.

Miss McNeil, M.P.S., has been with us for some months, and, though on furlough, has visited a large number of our Congregations, delivering addresses on the Medical Work of the Mission, and has met with gratifying success.

For some time the W.M.A. has wished to have a fully qualified Medical Missionary for Sholinghur, to act with the Missionaries at present there, and to take charge of the Hospital which has just been completed. Your Comto take charge of the Hospital which has just been completed. Your Committee has expressed its hearty approval of the desire of the Women's Missionary Association, and has agreed that, while that Association would, as far as possible, endeavour to provide the extra amount required for the salary of the Missionary, in the event of there being any shortage the amount would be paid out of the General Funds. The Board of Missions has been advised of this forward movement.

Since your Committee approved of this additional service to the Mission, two of our most honoured and enthusiastic workers in the cause of Foreign Missions (Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Park) have generously offered to defray the travelling expenses of a Lady Doctor from the Home land to India, and provide her salary for the first two years. E. M. GOODLET.

#### VICTORIA.

#### REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE.

#### NEW HEBRIDES BRANCH.

Interesting and encouraging reports have been received from each member of our Mission staff, and from the Agents of the John L. Paton Mission Committee. Many of the natives who have been long connected with the Mission have given increasing proof of their attachment to the truth, while many others have given up their heathen practices and have sought the guidance and teaching of our representatives. The Missionaries themselves have been very busy, and in addition to their ordinary work several of them have been engaged in translating portions of the Holy Scriptures into the dialects of the people.

But while there has been all this to encourage, there has been much to try the faith of our Agents and those who are charged with the carrying on to mourn the sad and unexpected deaths of Mrs. John G. Paton and her daughter-in-law, the wife of Rev. Fred. J. Paton. They were both devoted workers, and they both drew to themselves the love and esteem of all who were associated with them.

Early in 1904 Dr. McCausland, who had only entered on his work, was forced, through the continued serious illness of his wife, to return to Victoria, and as there seemed no hope of his being able to go back to the Islands, he handed in his resignation, which was accepted by the Committee with much regret.

Dr. Sandilands also resigned through ill-health after ten years of earnest

and successful work.

At the end of 1904, Rev. George Fleming became very seriously ill, and under the direction of his doctor came to Melbourne. At first the symptoms were most unfavourable, but he so far recovered that he was able to return

recently to his station.

Rev. D. MacDonald, D.D., was also forced by illness to return to Victoria in April. His physician has taken a very serious view of his illness, and has pronounced him unfit for further work in a tropical climate, but it is hoped that after a few months' rest in Victoria he may still be enabled to render service to the Church.

#### CHINESE.

The Rev. James Several changes have taken place since last report. Chue, who for upwards of twenty years had been Superintendent of the Mission, resigned and returned to China, where he continues to reside and preach to his countrymen. He has been succeeded by the Rev. John Tong Wai, who for many years acted as his assistant in Ballarat. Paul Chan has taken charge of the Beechworth Mission, and has added to it Wangaratta, Rutherglen and Wahgunyah. Since his appointment he has raised among the Chinese upwards of £100 for church building and renovation. At all our stations our Agents have faithfully discharged their duties, and at present report several candidates for baptism.

We have to report the death of Andrew Goon, the catechist at Ararat.

#### ABORIGINES.

The Rev. F. A. Hagenauer continues the superivision of the station at Ramahyuck. The Aborigines Protection Board has supplied a teacher for the children in place of the one removed by the Education Department. Both at Ramahyuck and Corranderrk the blacks, though not demonstrative, are very attentive to their religious duties. It is some satisfaction to know that the remnants of a once numerous and badly-used race are now being carefully looked after, and that they are responding intelligently to the efforts put forth to enlighten them in the knowledge of the truth and of Jesus as their Saviour.

#### KOREA.

The work in Korea advances. Spheres of work in the southern portion of the province of Kyeng Sang have been mutually agreed upon by the two Missions therein interested, viz., the American Presbyterian and our own. The population committed to the care of our missionaries is estimated at

Dr. Currell is under instruction to proceed into the interior and begin work in the large city of Chin-ju. The Committee has been rejoiced by the benefit of the Catherine Kay Bequest for Medical Mission Work." The income from this will suffice for the doctor's salary.

The Women's Missionary Union is engaged in raising funds to perpetuate the memory of the late Mrs. J. G. Paton by the erection of a hospital in Korea, as well as a church in the New Hebrides. Two new lady Missionaries have been appointed, and will proceed to their field in September. Our staff consists now of three married missionaries and five unmarried. The Committee hopes soon to be in a position to send out another worker.

#### THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION.

The Union now has upwards of 150 branches. It supports one married missionary and five unmarried lady workers in Korea, and, in addition, maintains an orphanage there. The salary of an Indian native evangelist is raised. Contributions to the extent of £75 are forwarded to North Queensland, principally for the maintenance of orphans. The school for Chinese children in Melbourne, conducted by Miss Pye, has removed into more comfortable and commodious quarters, and reports an increase in attendance.

Mission bands amongst the children have been started. Over 120 boxes were forwarded to Missionaries in Queensland, Korea, and the New Hebrides, the estimated value of which was £500. The income for the last year was £1100. If to this be added the £500, the value of the boxes, the contribu-

tions of the Union for the year really amounted to £1600.

# QUEENSLAND.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HEATHEN MISSIONS.

The Report of your Committee this year is similar in character to those presented for several years past, in that it deals more fully with that branch of the work in which we are only partners than with that which is our own. This is, of course, unavoidable, seeing that our own Mission is gradually being extinguished through the action of the Federal Government. However much we may regret the passing of our own Mission, we have reason to thank God for all the good that has been accomplished by its agency during the years of its existence.

1. Kanaka Mission.—There is nothing of special importance to record in connection with this branch of our work. Mr. MacIntyre has pursued his various duties with zeal, and has been untiring in his efforts to care for the highest needs of those committed to his charge.

The Mission is within measurable distance of its closing through the return of the natives to their Islands, and this, coupled with the fact that many of our people have never looked with much favour upon this work, embarrasses us considerably financially, as many of those who used to give are not now doing so with the old liberality, and the result is that, as the bal ance-sheet shows, there is a very considerable amount on the debit side. Your Committee hopes, however, that during the ensuing year, which will probably be the last of the Mission's existence, our people will give liberally, so that when we have to close our doors we may do so free from debt.

2. MISSION TO ABORIGINES.—The great event of the year has been the opening of the new station at the Archer River, under the Rev. Mr. Richter. That this work, which has been so long in view, should at last have become an actuality is matter of great joy to your Committee, and we trust that the new Station may be a centre of blessing.

The cost of the new buildings at the Archer amounts so far to £321 4s., and of this amount £200 has been paid by the Queensland Government, while the remainder has been met by a payment of £ from a fund under the control of Mr. Hey and £ paid by the Board of Missions.

The opening of the new Station means that each of the State Churches will have to increase the amount of their annual grant; and the amount of increase due by your Church is £37 10s. This we have agreed to pay, and the P.W.M.U., with characteristic generosity, have sent your Committee a cheque for this amount for the first year.

The work at all stations has gone on in a satisfactory manner, and we have good reason for the hope that our Mission among the Aborigines will be much blessed of God.

During the year your Committee have had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Ward, who was returning to Mapoon after a well-earned furlough.

The Rev. F. L. Paton has been forced to resign his position as Mission Agent, owing to ill-health. This is a great blow to our work, but we hope that Mr. Paton may speedily be restored to health again.

Your Committee learn with deep regret that Dr. Roth, the Protector of Aborigines, has resigned his position. Dr. Roth has ever been a warm friend of our Mission, and has on many occasions rendered valuable aid. We shall miss him much.

In conclusion, your Committee desire to impress upon members of Assembly the necessity for an increase of liberality on the part of our congregations, so that our Mission work may be carried on in no grudging fashion, but with a generosity worthy of so splendid a cause.

#### SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Chalmers Manse, 119 North Terrace, Adelaide, August 16th, 1905.

The Rev. Thomas MacMillan, Missionary for the South Australian Church, left Australia on an extended holiday in December, 1903, and did not return till May, 1905. Of work done by him on the field no report can be submitted. During the interval, in May, 1904, however, the Rev. T. Watt Leggatt, of Malekula, visited this State (at the request of the P.W.M.U.) in the interest of Missionary enterprise, and although his stay was short it was very inspiriting. Owing to the absence of Mr. Macmillan on furlough, the usual periodical letters, giving an account of the prominent features and successive phases of the work, were not forthcoming, and they were greatly missed. On his arrival in Australia, Mr. Macmillan himself was minded to go direct to Tanna, for the sake of the work there. But your Committee were unanimously of opinion that it would be in every way better if he visited the several congregations of the Church, even though, at that season of the year, the weather is not always the most agreeable. Arrangements were accordingly made to carry out this design, and nearly all the time of his seven weeks' sojourn here was spent in making these visitations, during which the Missionary knowledge of the people has been increased and their zeal revived. Nor is there any doubt that by this method Mr. Macmillan has knit the hearts of the people more closely to himself, and thus furthered the object which both he and we hold so dear. It should be added that Mrs. Macmillan did splendid service also to the common cause in her own unassuming way. For the year 1905 there is a decrease in the contributions:—New Hebrides Fund, £208 against £248; Queensland Aboriginal Fund, £25 as against £30. The Committee trust that during the current year there will be a return to more satisfactory financial conditions.

#### TASMANIA.

#### REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS COMMITTEE.

I have to report that our Foreign Missions Committee deals specially with the maintenance of a Missionary on Epi, New Hebrides. Our Missionary, the Rev. R. W. Fraser, has now retired, after 23 years' work. His work stands as a lasting memorial to faithful service in the power of the Gospel. A new Missionary is not yet appointed, the station being temporarily in the charge of the Rev. F. Riddle, a neighbouring Missionary. We are much concerned with putting right our finances, which for a long time have been drifting badly in arrears. A large staff of native teachers is, however, maintained. Our total income for the last 12 months has been only £158 12s. 6d., all of which has been absorbed, leaving a total deficit at the present time of over £150. A special effort is now being made to put this right.

#### REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS COMMITTEE.

The Committee report with regret the loss, through the departure from the State, of their first Convener, the Rev. J. J. Gilmore, and acknowledge his good services to the cause of Foreign Missions.

I'wo matters have occupied the attention of the Committee during the year:—(1) Missionary boxes, and (2) Mission work among the Aborigines. The Committee have had 150 Mission boxes made, at a cost of 4½d. each, and these have been distributed throughout Western Australia, and they trust these boxes will be a means of encouraging systematic giving to Foreign Missions. Much consideration has been given to the question of the inauguration of a United Aboriginal Mission Station within the State, and the five Churches represented are now dealing with the matter in their respective Executives. This Committee has promised to be responsible for £100 per

#### II.

#### REPORT OF THE COLLEGE COMMITTEE.

Since the last meeting of the General Assembly the main part of the work of the Committee has fallen to the Executive, which met in Melbourne as occasion arose. At a meeting of the General Committee held in Sydney on the 21st September, 1904, the Syllabus for the Entrance Examination in 1906, and that for the Exit Examination in 1905, were adopted. These were published in the Calendars of the two Halls, but a difference between the two as printed has shown that if a Year Book for the whole Church is not to be published, it is desirable to have a Calendar common to both Halls.

The question as to the most suitable time for the Entrance Examination was raised, and remitted for consideration to a Committee consisting of the

Professors and Lecturers, with Dr. Clouston as Convener.

Various cases of students were dealt with. Subject to the recommendation of the Victorian Assembly, it was agreed that Messrs. Vickerman and Farquhar (who had passed the first year in Arts) be admitted to the Entrance Examination. The Committee had before it a recommendation from the General Assembly of South Australia to admit Mr. J. W. Rankine (a Home Mission Agent of the Church) to the Entrance Examination of 1905, but in view of the new regulations under consideration by the Church, for the train view of the new regulations under consideration by the Church for the trainwhen of the new regulations under consideration by the Church for the training of Home Missionaries, it was deemed undesirable to deal with this exceptional case, and agreed to advise Mr. Rankine to prepare himself for passing the Matriculation Examination, with Greek as one of the subjects.

It was decided that Mr. W. Laurie, who had passed his first year in Arts, and also his first session in the Theological Hall as a private student, be accepted as a regular student, provided he passed the Entrance Examination

for 1905.

In the Entrance Examination, which was held in February, 1905, seventeen students entered. Of these ten passed in the first examination, and G Cranston, a student from the United Free Church College, Glasgow, was also examined in Scripture and Hebrew, and passed.

The Rev. Professor Skene having sent in his resignation as an examiner in Theology, it was agreed to recommend the appointment of the Rev. P. J. Murdoch, M.A. It was agreed, further, to recommend that in room of the Rev. J. B. Russell, now residing in Auckland, the Rev. J. F. Macrae be appointed an examiner in Scripture, and that the Rev. D. Macrae Stewart be appointed an examiner in English and History.

The attention of the Executive was drawn to the difference in length of the course of study in particular subjects in the two Halls, arising from a resolution passed by last General Assembly on an overture from St. Andrew's College Theological Faculty. It was agreed that full consideration of the matter be deferred until the meeting of the General Committee in September.

The subject of the B.D. degree, which has already been before the General Assembly, has not been lost sight of. By the action of the Council of Churches in Melbourne, the matter will shortly be brought before the Council of the University of Melbourne, and will receive there very influential support. The prospect of some action being taken by the University favourable to the conferring of Divinity Degrees is made the brighter that an Act entitled "The Divinity Degrees Act, 1905," and the object of which is "to enable the University of New Zealand to confer Degrees in Divinity," has been before the New Zealand Parliament. Further information on this matter will be put before the Assembly.

This is but a progress report. The Committee will meet before the General Assembly is convened, and will issue a final report.

## THEOLOGICAL HALL, ORMOND COLLEGE, MELBOURNE.

# REPORT OF SENATUS, 1905.

The fortieth session of the Hall was opened on March 8th, a public Inaugural Lecture being delivered by the Rev. Professor Skene, M.A., on his entering upon the duties of the Chair of Hebrew and Old Testament Exegesis and Homiletics. The subject of lecture was "The Old Testament Prophet and the New Testament Procacher." Twenty-seven students, all of them studying for the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church, attended the classes during the Session. This is the largest number since the Hall's foundation. Another gratifying feature is that all have come through the gateway of the Entrance Examination, and a large proportion are University men and Graduates. Some of them have won the highest honours in their respective departments of study in the University of Melbourne. One student comes from the Presbyterian Church of New Zealand.

The following students, having completed their three years' Theological Course, have proceeded to the recent Exit Examination in Church History, Theology, Hebrew, and Old Testament Exegesis and New Testament Greek and Exegesis:—Messrs. Douglas Bruce, W. R. Byers, C. A. O. Keays, D. M. Lyall, B.A., A. E. Macdonald, M.A., George Rowe, B.A., and A. J. Stewart. The following, having completed their second year course, have proceeded to the Exit Examination in Christian Philosophy and Apologetic:—Messrs. Carl Foerster, B.A.; R. C. Foyster, B.A.; A. O. Hardie, B.A.; J. Craig (N.Z.), S. H. Hood, C. R. Houston, J. P. MacDougall, B.A.; J. C. McPhee, and E. G. Petherick

The health of the students has been good, and their attendance also good. The Class of the Rev Edward Rorke, B.A., the "Wilson Lecturer on Elocution," in the Hall has been regularly attended, and has given much satisfaction. All the lectures, exercises, and tests have been conducted with the aim of producing natural and effective reading and devotional utterance in the pulpit, and also natural, clearly-enunciated, and persuasive delivery of sermons.

The Library has been still further strengthened, Dr. Macdonald having devoted to it much care for several years. The students avail themselves abundantly of its advantages.

During the session the "Ormond Students' Theologic Society" has carried on its work vigorously. A movement has also been inaugurated to form a United Theological Society, embracing the Theological students of Ormond, Trinity, and Queen's Colleges, for the promotion of study and the deepening of spiritual life. The Students' Missionary Society has carried on its earnest voluntary efforts in support of the Aboriginal Mission in North Queensland, and of a teacher in the New Hebrides.

A number of clergymen from outside the Hall have, by request, delivered occasional lectures to the students on various aspects of ministerial work.

The Senatus have heard with much regret that, owing to increasing deafness, the Rev. Professor Macdonald, D.D., their President for this session, has tendered to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Victoria his two-fold Chair of Church History and of Systematic Theology, his resignation to take effect at the close of next session. During Dr. Macdonald's years of teaching in the Hall, more than 150 students have passed through his classes, the majority of whom are now ministers of the Presbyterian Church, some of them already occupying positions of great prominence in this or other lands. The Senatus desire to express their deep sense of the great services Dr. Macdonald has rendered to the Church, to the Hall, and to the Church's Ministry, and their sincere regret at the prospect of the flight of time and the wear of years causing him to separate himself from high and sacred work which has been to him an object of intense love, and into which he has thrown ungrudgingly his life's energy and powers.

The Session was closed by a public meeting, at which the farewell address to the students (on Ministerial Work and Efficiency) was delivered by the Right Rev. W. S. Rolland. Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Victoria.

# REPORT OF THE THEOLOGICAL FACULTY OF ST. ANDREW'S COLLEGE, SYDNEY.

During the Session 1905, the classes have been regularly conducted by the Professors and Lecturers in charge of the several departments—namely, Dr. Andrew Harper, in Energetical Theology of the Old Testament and Hebrew; Dr. George MacInnes in Energetical Theology of the New Testament; Dr. T. E. Clouston in Historical Theology; Dr. W. M. Dill Macky in Biblical and Systematic Theology; Dr. John Kinross in Apologetics and Christian Ethics; and Mr. John Garland, LL.B., in Ecclesiastical Law and Procedure. In addition, the Rev. Robert Steel, M.A., the Steel lecturer for the year, conducted a class during the second term in Pastoral Theology, and at the invitation of the Faculty, the Rev. J. Anderson Gardiner, B.A., gave the students instruction in Sacred Rhetoric.

The number of students in attendance has been the same as in 1904—namely, 10. Of these three were in the third year, Messrs. Percy Hope, B.A., George Logan, B.A., and J. N. McGee. Four were in the second year, namely, Messrs George Cranston, J. T. Dudley, B.A., W. S. Lawrie, and J. N. Robertson, M.A. Three were in the first year, Messrs. Victor Clark Duff, B.A., J. C. Gibson, and John Paterson, B.A. At the close of the Session, class examinations were conducted by the Faculty, with the result that all the students were adjudged to have fulfilled their duties satisfactorily.

The Faculty are satisfied with the result of the change made, by which the attention of students was confined each year to a limited number of subjects, in place of diffusing their energies over the whole course, and recommend its continuance.

The Library has been enriched by a number of the most recent theological books in every department, but the funds at present at the disposal of the Faculty are almost exhausted, and the Faculty appeal to the friends of the Hall to supply them with the means to supply this necessary part of the equipment of the Hall.

Your Committee have to report that the following questions were addressed to the Conveners of the State Home Mission Committees:—

- A. Would you kindly furnish the Home Mission Committee of Australia with a brief report of the work done by your Committee since the last meeting of the General Assembly of Australia, September, 1903?
- 1. Also kindly state how many Charges have been erected during the period named in your State.
  - 2. How many Charges, if any, reduced to Stations.
  - 3. Also how many new Mission Stations have been organised.
  - 4. And how many, if any, abandoned, or otherwise dealt with.

#### Further note:-

- a. Any particular encouraging circumstances associated with the work of your Committee.
  - b. Difficulties and hindrances to the progress of the work.
- c. Any suggestions which may occur to you as likely to be of advantage to the Committee in furthering Home Mission work within your State, and Australia generally.
- B. How many Home Mission Agents have you in active service who are (1) Ordained Ministers, (2) Licentiates, (3) Students under Theological training, (4) Students in Arts, (5) Students preparing for the University, (6) Others?

# 1. The following reports have been received:— NEW SOUTH WALES.

This report refers to the work done by the Committee during the two years ending with the meetings of the State Assembly in May, 1904, and May, 1905.

(1) New Charges have been initiated at the following places—9 in number:—Dulwich Hill, Campsie, Lindfield (now with a settled minister), Auburn, Belmont and Boolaroo, Manilla, Cessnock Weston and Kurri-Kurri, Barrington and Gloucester, Kyogle.

Barrington and Gloucester, Kyogle.

(2) One former parish—Gundagai—has been reduced to a Mission Station, and one Home Mission Station—Wilcannia—has been temporarily left without services. The parish of Wentworth has been without a minister for some time. But we hope to re-occupy both these important spheres at

an early date.

Some of the encouraging features of our work have been the demand for assistants in eight of our large country parishes, with a view to their division as soon as practicable. Requests for the supply of ordinances have come from a number of places, in some cases stimulated by the visits of the Commissioner of Assembly, and in other cases of their own motion.

Commissioner of Assembly, and in other cases of their own motion.

The difficulties of the Committee have been very great, owing to the insufficient supply of fully qualified Agents. In the vacations of the Theological Halls, the students are available, but when they have to return to Sydney to attend the classes, we have been obliged to send into the field men who have received little or no training, rather than allow parishes and stations to remain vacant. Some of these have done good service, but their work in the field has been detrimental to the progress of their studies.

The number of Agents at present at work is:—Ordained Ministers, 18; Divinity Students, 10; Students attending the University, 4; Students prepar-

ing for matriculation, 4; Catechists and others, 23.

The return of good seasons to the State has made possible what has been under consideration for several years, namely, the sending forth of a Gospel car under the charge of an ordained Minister into the remote western interior. The Rev. P. A. Smithhas accepted the invitation of the Committee to undertake this work, and is at present on his way from Bourke to Milparinka and Wilcannia. This scheme has evolved the interest of the members of the Church, and some generous gifts have been the result, notably the donation of £100 from the Honourable W. Ross.

The scheme for the establishment of a Home Mission Settlement in a suitable part of the city of Sydney has been sanctioned by the Assembly, but it has been decided to amalgamate with the larger scheme of the Institutional Church which is now being devised by an influential Committee.

#### VICTORIA.

A. A brief report of the work of the Committee since the Assembly of 1903 will be found in the answers to the questions asked.

(4) A large and representative special committee has been appointed by the Assembly to consider fully the better organisation of Home Missions, and the better training of agents.

Want of funds to raise Home Mission Stations to the status of sanctioned Charges, with ordained ministry.

#### (c) Suggestions.

The appointment of a Home Mission Director, or the provision of some other means for complete oversight and organisation.

The establishment of an itinerant ministry for visiting stations in the

back-blocks.

The publication of fuller information as to the needs and possibilities of the outlying districts of the larger States.

The establishment of a Training Institute for Home Missionaries.

#### TASMANIA REPORT, 1904-5.

The Home Mission Stations of Tasmania are administered by a Committee appointed by the Assembly, and consisting of one member from each Presbytery, together with the Clerk of Assembly, and the Treasurer of the Church.

The present Committee is: Rev. F. E. Oxer, Convener (Midlands); Rev. A. R. Osborn (North); Rev. J. Heyer (South); Rev. J. Russell (Clerk); and the Hon. Jas. Murdoch (Treasurer).

There are at present 11 Home Mission Charges, including some forty

preaching stations.

The funds at the disposal of the Committee consist solely of amounts contributed annually by the Churches, together with donations. There are no capitalised funds.

Charges erected since September, 1903: Zechan, West Tamar, West Devort. We expect that two other Mission Stations, viz., Queenstown and onport.

Stanley, will become Charges in the near future.

Charges reduced: None.

New Missions organised: Work has been recommenced at Ulverstone, and preaching stations established at Sandhill and Invermay, suburbs of Launceston.

Stations abandoned: None.

#### Encouragements.

Interest in Home Mission work is being stimulated throughout the island and progress is noted in more than one direction. Extension work is being pushed on privately by many congregations, with some success. Our prospects on the west and north-west coasts—the most progressive portions of Tasmania—are distinctly more hopeful than they were a few years back, though we have still great problems facing us, and a vast amount of ground to cover. Opportunities have been lost, chances muddled, and we are now late in the field and deficient in resources.

#### Difficulties, Hindrances, &c.

There are thirteen regular Charges in Tasmania; six of these fail to raise the minimum stipend of £200, and can therefore do little for Home and Foreign Missions. This leaves seven congregations to raise some £250 per annum for Foreign Missions, and, in addition, to sustain 11 Mission Stations, many of which are struggling. As there are no public offices, all the details of administration fall on the Convener and his Committee. With such a small roll this is a very heavy burden.

Several of the Mission Stations are decayed Charges in old settled districts, where the vis inertiar makes the task of sustaining ordinances depressingly heavy.

Mission work has suffered most in Tasmania from the type of agents employed. We have depended too much on the rejected tools of Victoria and New South Wales, the result being that station after station has been successively ruined. The Committee will help us by taking measures for eliminating unsuitable men from the service, by making it impossible for weak Churches to employ just anybody, and more particularly by providing a supply of more or less adequately equipped men. The scheme for training missionaries will, unless carefully guarded, become a dead letter in the weaker Churches.

(2) Licentiates: 0.

(3) Students under Theological Training: 4 going through our own Missionary Course; 2 who have passed the Victorian Course.

(4) Others: 3.

P.S.—Another difficulty we meet is the disposal of elderly agents whose usefulness is past. Tasmania would benefit very much were beneficiary funds organised for the whole of Australia, and also if some home of refuge could be established for decayed missionaries. We are blocked in at least two places by our unwillingness to cast adrift worthy men for whose services we have no other outlet.

#### Encouragements.

Gratitude of the people ministered.

#### Difficulties.

These lie in the fact that a portion of our population is settled over an extensive area, making it difficult to reach the people, or to gather them into congregations. Another difficulty, created by the fact just stated, is the number of Home Mission Charges in proportion to the settled Charges. The financial strain on the settled Charges to assist Home Mission Charges is more than they can stand. In addition to the Home Mission Charges and preaching places now cared for and being fostered with a view to being erected into regular Charges, we have at least four districts that we could take up had we the means.

#### Suggestions.

I purpose to recommend to the next meeting of our State Assembly to appoint a Financial Secretary and Organising Agent with an office in the city.

#### OUEENSLAND.

Since a report of Home Mission work in Queensland was last submitted to your Committee operations have been steadily continued on about the same scale as during the period then under review. The feature of the work during the present period has been the development and organisation of the work in existing fields, rather than the opening up of new stations. This does not lend itself to report as the opening of new fields would, but it is quite as necessary, and with our means (men and money) imperative. We have not a sufficient revenue to enable us to subsidise many new fields. It is only as the older fields become developed and need less help that it is possible to take on new work which, as is usually the case, needs liberal financial backing from the Fund.

During the period which you wish reported upon, there has been a considerable amount of progress in nearly all of the fields under the care of this Committee. In some instances, the progress has been striking, while others have been the occasion of considerable disappointment. The encouraging features of the work have been, however, far more numerous and significant than the disappointments. The number of centres at which services are regularly conducted have increased, the attendances at services are better than they were, and generally a greater interest is manifest among the people. Much energy has been displayed in the erection of church-buildings, and in the procuring of sites for such buildings, which shows the determination of the people.

There is also a very successful Home Mission work being carried on by several congregations of the Church in their own vicinity. Charters Towers, Killarney, Warwick, and Allora Charges have been conspicuous in this work. In this way a great deal has been done to extend the agencies of the Church, and there is yet room for a great deal more of the same kind of enterprise.

The whole of the work of the Church in Queensland has been to some extent retarded by the large exodus of ministers to other States during the two years under review. On the other side, one minister from another State has been settled in Queensland, and four have come from the Home Churches—two from the United Free Church of Scotland, and two from the Irish Presbyterian Church.

We have been greatly encouraged and helped in our work by the liberal monetary assistance of all the Home Churches, having received during the period £300 from the United Free and £100 from the Church of Scotland, while the Irish Presbyterian Church sent £200. Without this assistance, our work, modest as it is, would have been attended by serious difficulties. These gifts have enabled us to make ends meet.

From the Old Country we have drawn the greater portion of our Home Missionaries, these being men trained in the Glasgow Institute and selected by Mr. Andrew Stewart, to whom we are deeply indebted for his deep interest in our work, and his willing help whenever it is needed.

In reply to your queries, I have to state that-

1. Five Charges have been erected.

2. One was reduced, but is included in the number erected, as it is now once more settled.

3. Three new Mission Stations have been organised.
4. None has been abandoned, but one has been provided for, for the present, by the neighbouring Charge.

Note on No. 3: Three new Stations are on the point of being taken up.

Amongst the encouraging circumstances connected with our work may be noted :-

1. A growing sense amongst our people generally of the urgent need of Home Mission work, and a feeling of shame at past indifference. (this may come a "forward movement" commensurate with the needs.

2. The desire for the services of the Church in districts where we are

not yet represented.

3. The number of young men who are desirous of giving themselves to the preaching of the Gospel. This is perhaps the most hopeful sign of our Church life at present.

Our difficulties and hindrances are, perhaps, such as are common to all such work. We want ministers and we want money. We have indifference to spiritual things to contend with. The giant forms of evil are in Queensland as they are elsewhere. But our main difficulties are those arising from the very scanty population which is spread over a great area. In many districts where we should have agents, the people could not themselves meet their salaries, and our limited income is not sufficient to render the assistance which would be required.

One or two suggestions which, if adopted, might help the work in this State and other States whose circumstances resemble our own, may be per-

1. If the Ministers of the Church exist for the Church, and not the Church for them, some attempt might be made to distribute them where they

are most needed.

2. The time has nearly come in the history of the United Church when the stronger sections of it may be expected to begin to help the weaker. An Australian Home Mission Fund for the assistance of the Church in the weaker States would be an evidence that our Union is more than a name. At present all that the stronger States do for Queensland is to call our best ministers to their vacant Charges. We want some practical results of our Union, and the sooner the better.

In reply to your query regarding the composition of our Home Mission staff, the following shows the condition in which ours is:—

Two ordained ministers are at work.
 We have no Licentiates.

3. Our one student in theology is not available for work.

4. Our one student in arts is not available for work.

5. One student preparing for matriculation is available for occasional work.

Ten Home Missionaries are employed.

It should be added that the Queensland Church has great interest in the scheme for the training of Home Missionaries with a view to the Ministry, and it is to be hoped that the Assembly will devise such methods as shall open the door to these Missionaries as widely as possible. They are good men, and it would be a pity if any scheme should be adopted which does not take into account the situation of such places as Queensland. scheme may meet the needs of the two large States; it does not seem to promise much to a State like ours.

#### WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

A. Our Church can report simply a steady holding on to work already begun. We have abandoned work at York through lack of support. At the present time, however, the Rev. D. B. Smith, who has done such excellent work as Superintendent of the Geraldton and Murchison Districts, is investigated. tigating Cue and Day Dawn with a view to establishing permanent work where necessary; and the Rev. G. Brewster is beginning work at Wagin on the Great Southern District. The Rev. A. Crow also reports having begun services at Kurrawang, eight miles from Kalgoorlie.

The Rev. J. H. Fordyce, who came out from Scotland in response to our appeal for men, is now ordained, and doing excellent work in Boulder. Four Mission Agents received from the Glasgow Bible Training Institute on a three years' engagement, have been at work here for almost a year, and their work is mostly highly satisfactory. Two of them, however, are required to work in Charges which ought to have settled ministers.

To the Bursary Fund £30 has been contributed, and we hope to allocate

it after the matriculation examination in December.

The Committee has adopted a scheme "for the purpose of making periodical visits to every Church in the State," and while it is impossible for us to appoint a Home Mission Superintendent, yet much is being done to keep in touch with and encourage our Home Mission Agents by visitation.

#### SECTION B.

#### COMMUNICATION ANENT THURSDAY ISLAND.

An important letter has ben received from the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of the Church of Queensland, anent Thursday Island,

which your Committee would lay before the Assembly:-

At the last meeting of my Committee, the matter of providing religious services for the Presbyterians and other non-Anglican Protestants at Thursday Island received consideration. The Rev. Joseph King, of the L.M.S., was present, and stated that at his recent visit to Thursday Island the people had met him in conference, and had expressed their desire to have a Presbyterian Minister appointed to labour there, or, failing a Presbyterian, a Congregationalist. Mr. King was averse to a Congregational Church being formed at Thursday Island, as the bulk of the people had Presbyterian connections. He desired to have a Minister stationed there who would exercise oversight of the converts of the Society who visited or resided at Thursday oversight of the converts of the Society who visited or resided at Thursday Island, and he was prepared to recommend that in the event of such an arrangement being entered into between the Presbyterian Church and the Society, the Society should make a grant to the Presbyterian Church for the Minister's support.

My Committee view very favourably this suggestion, and would like to see effect given to it. Their power to do so is limited, however. Their funds are not equal, at present, to the additional strain which this new work would cause; neither have they a man whom they could spare for the posi-

Considering, however, the peculiar situation and character of the place; that it is, in a manner, only accidentally Queensland territory; that it is of Commonwealth rather than State value; that its population is one of the most cosmopolitan in the world; the Committee decided to bring the matter of providing services by a minister of the Presbyterian Church under the notice of your Committee, and to suggest that the Presbyterian Church of Australia might at Thursday Island find a point where she could most fittingly and appropriately begin the Church Extension efforts of the United Church.

I beg to commend the matter to the earnest attention of vourself and the other members of the Home Mission Committee, and I trust that something may be done whereby the services of our Church may be extended soon to this important position.

#### SECTION C.

#### TRAINING OF HOME MISSION AGENTS.

A scheme of training for Home Mission Lay Agents with a view to the Ministry was laid before the General Assembly of 1903, approved of generally, and sent down to State Assemblies and Presbyteries. The returns received were representative of the whole Church, and these were duly considered according to the direction of the General Assembly by your Committee, and the following amended scheme was remitted to State Assemblies and Presbyteries: ---

#### IT IS REQUIRED :-

1. That the Agents who are to be admitted to this special course of training be men who are over twenty-three (23) years of age, approved of as to attainments, gifts, and Christian consistency by the State Assembly, having proper jurisdiction and accepted by the General Assembly of Australia.

#### (A.) NEW SOUTH WALES.

2. That such accepted Agents shall devote themselves to a preliminary course of training, and within four years from date of their acceptance by the General Assembly pass (a) the Matriculation Examination of a recognised University, or (b) the Senior University Examination (Sydney), or (c) a special Matriculation set by the General Assembly's College Committee, and also within the same period attend and pass at least four University Classes approved of by the General Assembly's College Committee, or pursue a course of study and examination under direction of the General Assembly's College Committee on such subjects and text-books as are approved by the General Assembly's College Committee.

3. That during the course special attention shall be given to the contents of the English Bible, English Language and Literature, Logic, Mental and Moral Philosophy, N.T. Greek, History and Political Economy.

4. That those who pass the course shall be eligible as candidates for entrance to one of the Theological Halls of the Church, and shall be examined on all the subjects of the Syllabus save Latin, Greek (other than N.T.), and Hebrew.

5. That during the recess of the Hall the Agents shall as far as possible be provided with work in their own State.

6. That after finishing their Hall course and passing the Exit Examination, they shall serve in the State in which their preliminary training was given for a period of at least four years.

All the State Assemblies have made returns to this Remit. These without exception approve of the principal features of the Scheme of Training. The amendments proposed deal with details. Twenty-two Presbyteries have made Returns to Remit; 12 approve or approve generally; 7 approve with amendments; one proposes a Scheme of its own; one disapproves, and one declines to give an opinion.

As a fair example of the amendments proposed, your Committee give here the Returns from the General Assemblies of New South Wales and

Victoria :-

#### (B.) VICTORIA.

1. That the Agents who are to be admitted to this special course of training be men who are over twenty-three (23) years of age, approved of as to attainments, gifts and Christian consistency by the State Assembly having proper jurisdiction, and accepted by the General Assembly of Australia.

2. That such accepted Agents shall devote themselves to a preliminary course of four years' training, from the date of their acceptance by the General Assembly, and shall within that period pass (a) the Matriculation Examination of a recognised University, or (b) the Senior Public Examination in connection with the University of Sydney, or (c) where the University has no accessible Matriculation Centre, a special Examination, held on the Matriculation paper set by the University and examined by the College Committee according to the same percentage applied by the University; and thereafter shall also within the same period attend and pass at least four University Classes approved of by the General Assembly's College Committee, or pursue the course of study and examination prescribed by the University under direction of the General Assembly's College Committee.

3. That during the course special attention shall be given to the contents

3. That during the course special attention shall be given to the contents of the English Bible, English Language and Literature, Logic, Mental and Moral Philosophy, History, and Political Economy.

4. That those who pass the course shall be eligible as candidates for entrance to one of the Theological Halls of the Church, and shall be examined on all the subjects of the Syllabus save Latin, Greek, and Hebrew.

6. That during the recess of the Hall the Agents shall, as far as possible, be provided with work in their own State.

- 6. That after finishing their Hall course and passing the Exit Examination they shall serve in the State in which their preliminary training was given for a period of at least four years.
- 7. That, where any dispute shall arise as to the States named in clauses 5 and 6, it shall be determined by the Home Mission Committee of the General Assembly of Australia.

Sec. 1 be approved.

Sec. 2 be amended so as to read:—That such accepted Agents shall devote themselves to a course of training leading up to the Hall, and (1) within four years from date of their acceptance by the General Assembly pass (a) the Matriculation Examination of a recognised University, or (b) the Senior University Examination (Sydney), and also, thereafter, within the same period, attend and pass at least four University Classes approved of by the General Assembly's College Committee, or (2) pursue a course of study and annual Examination for four years under direction of the College Committee, on such subjects and text-books as are approved by the said Committee.

Sec. 3 amended so as to read:—That during the Course special attention shall be given to the contents of the English Bible, English Language, Logic, Mental and Moral Philosophy, History, Political Economy, N.T. Greek, and the Elements of Hebrew.

- (1) Papers to be set and Answers Examined by the Examining Board of the College Committee.
- (2) Examinations to be conducted locally and simultaneously under supervision of the Presbyteries to which the Agents belong.
- (a) A Presbytery shall appoint one or more of its Members to direct and assist the Agent or Agents in Study, and to supervise the Annual Examination.
- (b) Studies shall be directed according to the Syllabus prepared by the College Committee.

Sec. 4 amended so as to read:—That those who pass the course shall be eligible as candidates for entrance to one of the Theological Halls of the Church, and shall be examined in all subjects of the Syllabus for Entrance save Latin and Classical Greek.

Sections 5 and 6 approved.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.

Your Committee beg to submit their Report to the General Assembly as follows

Your Committee recommended to the last General Assembly that the Rev. S. H. Chapple, formerly a Wesleyan Methodist Minister, should be received as a Minister of this Church, on condition that he serve a year's probation, and in the course of that year pass an Examination in Hebrew; and this recommendation the Assembly adopted. Mr. Chapple satisfied these conditions, and he has been inducted into the charge of Tylden, in the Presbytery of Macedon, Victoria, where he has done and is doing excellent work.

The Assembly also remitted to this Committee the petition of the Minister and congregation of the Congregational Church, Devonport, Tasmania, to be received into the Presbyterian Church of Australia, giving them full powers to deal with the matter. Your Committee, having given their best consideration to the case, resolved to receive the petitioners into the Church, according to their application to last General Assembly.

The Home Mission and Church Extension Committee of the Church of Queensland have notified your Committee to the effect that the Rev. James Manwell Rodgers Dale and the Rev. Samuel Marten, Ministers of the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, and Mr. Allan Macdonald Mackillop, Probationer of the United Free Church of Scotland, having been commissioned to the Church in Queensland by the Churches to which they belonged, have been received in accordance with the Regulations for the Reception of Ministers.

The Presbytery of Melbourne South, Victoria, transmit the petition of the Rev. D. McFarlane to be received as an ordained Minister of the Presbyterian Church of Australia. Mr. McFarlane was licensed by the Presbytery of St. Andrew's Church of Scotland, after having passed through the curriculum prescribed by that Church. He received a commission from the Colonial Committee to the Presbyterian Church of South Africa, and was appointed Minister of Newcastle, Natal, where he laboured for thirteen years. He presents a Presbyterial certificate from the Presbytery of Natal, testifying to his ministerial standing and the high regard in which he was held for his character and work. The Presbytery transmitting his petition strongly recommend that its prayer be granted.

The Rev. Robert Alexander Redmond, B.A., petitions through the Presbytery of the Hawkesbury, New South Wales, to be received as a Minister of the Church in full standing. Mr. Redmond was licensed by the Presbytery of Belfast, and was afterwards ordained by the Presbytery of Ballymena to the pastoral oversight of one of their congregations. He came to Australia for reasons of health, and, finding his health restored, he wishes to remain. Since arriving in 1903, he has been doing work for the Home Mission Committee of the Church of New South Wales. He presents a certificate from the Presbytery of Ballymena, bearing witness to his ministerial standing and the esteem and confidence in which he was held by his brethren. The Presbytery of the Hawkesbury recommend that the prayer of Mr. Redmond's petition be granted.

The Rev. G. D. Lee, who was Minister of Cavendish in the Presbytery of Hamilton, Victoria, till 1903, and was Minister emeritum of the Church of Victoria till 1904, when he severed his connection with that Church, applies to be reinstated as Minister emeritum. The circumstances in which Mr. Lee makes his application are the following. When he was inducted, more than 30 years ago, it was to a very difficult and expensive charge, and not being able to join the Beneficiary Funds of the Victorian Church, for the sake of his family he joined the Widows and Orphans' Fund. Hence it happened that when, at the age of 77, he resigned his charge through inability to do the travelling the work made necessary, he had no claim on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. He had, however, bought a small piece of ground, and hoped, with the help of his family to make a living by dairying. But his daughter, on whom almost entirely he depended for help, became ill with chronic weakness, and he was threatened with the loss of his land. In the circumstances, he was advised to make application for the return of half his payments into the Widows and Orphans' Fund. According to the rules of this Fund, such an application cannot be granted unless the applicant "ceases to be a Minister of the Church." Though extremely unwilling, Mr. Lee felt

compelled to make the application, conforming to the rule, and he severed his connection with the Fund and ceased to be a Minister of the Church. Mr. Lee is now over 80 years of age, and if reinstated would not expect to be employed in the service of the Church or to receive any financial benefit. he earnestly desires to end his days as a Minister of that Church to which he has given more than 30 years of his life's work, and he petitions accordingly. The Rev. Charles Taylor, formerly a Congregational Minister, makes

application to be received as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church. Taylor's petition is sent through the Presbytery of Perth, Western Australia, and sets forth the petitioner's previous history, his literary and theological training, and his reasons for desiring admission into the Presbyterian Church. The transmitting Presbytery strongly recommend that his petition be granted, as also does the "Moderator's Committee" of the General Assembly of Western Australia. There are also statements by the Session and Board of Management of Subiaco, in the Perth Presbytery, where Mr. Taylor has been reached as the control of the contro lor has been working for more than a year, bearing testimony to the great success of Mr. Taylor's ministry in their congregation, and expressing their earnest desire that his petition should be granted.

The Rev. Walter A. Hobson, formerly a Congregational Minister, sends

a petition through the Presbytery of Toowoomba, Queensland, praying to be received as a Minister of this Church. In his petition Mr. Hobson sets forth his previous history, his literary and theological training, his ministerial experience, and his reasons for wishing to join the Presbyterion Church. He also submits documents bearing testimony to the regard in which he is held

by those who know him.

The Presbytery of Brisbane, Queensland, Church, transmit a petition from the Rev. Charles Edward James, formerly a Minister of the Methodist Church, asking to be received into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church of Australia. Mr. James's petition contains a statement as to his previous history, and gives his reasons for his desire to become a Minister of the Presbyterian Church. Presbyterian Church. He also in his petition and in a letter sent to the Committee at the request of the Convener, gives an account of his literary and theological training, and he submits a large number of documents bearing testimony to his work in the Ministry of the Methodist Church. The Presbytery of Brisbane send the petition with a strong recommendation that its prayer be granted.

The attention of your Committee has been called to the following resolu-tion of the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, and we bring it before the Assembly, as it may be necessary to modify some of the rules for

the admission of Ministers :-

"That in future no commission other than a special one be granted by the Committee, unless the Minister has been appointed directly to a charge by the Committee, or has been selected and sent out by them at the request of one of the Colonial Churches."

In a letter accompanying their resolution, the Convener of the Committee salys:-" The Committee feel that a Presbyterial certificate ought to be a sufficient guarantee of character and ministerial efficiency, and should certainly be preferable to one granted by them, as the Presbyteries are more likely to have fuller information. This resolution has been come to with a view to safeguard the interests of the Colonial Churches, as well as of the Colonial Committee.'

#### V.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE FEDERATION OF PROTESTANT CHURCHES.

#### NEW SOUTH WALES.

It was resolved at the last Assembly that the members of the Committee in each State should act as local executives for carrying on negotiations with the Churches of the State. With this authority, the New South Wales members approached the representatives of the Congregational Churches and the Methodist Churches, and meetings were held of the joint committees, with large attendances. Up to this point, the Presbyterian Church had held con-

ferences with the Congregational and Methodist Churches, but these two had not previously met together. Consequently, much of the work had to be done over again. In the first instance, three sub-committees were appointed— (1) to draw up a scheme for the united training of students for the ministry; (2) to devise a system of polity; and (3) to elaborate a doctrinal basis. These sub-committees have met and made considerable progress in their respective departments, but none of them is yet in a position to present a report to lay before this Assembly. So far as the united training of students is concerned, it does not appear that there is any insuperable difficulty to prevent amalgamation of the Theological Halls at an early date. The same subjects are taught in each, and all that would be needed is a modification of the existing arrangements of the classes, and the times at which they meet. Sub-committee on Polity has come to a general agreement on the courts of the Church and the conditions of membership, and is now considering the tenure of the ministerial office, and the method of appointing ministers to congregations. The Sub-committee on Doctrine has made the least progress, owing to the absence from the State of some of its members, and other causes. It appears that the elaboration of a basis of union is a process that will demand a considerable time, but so much unanimity and good feeling has already been displayed that the Committee is hopeful that if they are re-appointed they may be in a position to present a report for the consideration of the next Assembly.

The Sub-Committee in Victoria pursued a similar course to that of the Sub-Committee in New South Wales. It was laid upon the table of the Committee ten Articles of Belief as a portion of the proposed Basis of Doctrine. This has not been considered by the Committee, and no opinion has been expressed concerning it, until reports have been received from the sub-committees in the other States. It was agreed, however, to transmit the document

to the other sub-committees for their information.

An interesting communication has been received from the Anglican At a meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney, a Committee was appointed to confer with other Churches in regard to all matters in which co-operation and federation might be possible. This Committee has suggested that a joint meeting should be held, and we have agreed, but the conference has not yet been held. T. E. CLOUSTON, D.D., Convener.

#### REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE, 1905.

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting the Audited Balance Sheets and the Report as follows:-

With regard to the General Assembly Expenses Fund Account, all the State Churches have made the payments in accordance with the assessment, and, after discharging the expenses of the last Assembly Meeting, a balance of £105 8s 5d remains on hand. It should be noted that care will require to be exercised in the working of this account, otherwise it may be necessary to increase the amount of the assessment, and this would be most undesirable.

In accordance with the instruction given at last meeting of the Assembly the Church Hymnary Royalty has been received by your Committee direct from the Trustees up to the 31st March, 1905. The total amount received since last meeting of Assembly being £195 10s; the present balance in hand including interest to 31st December, 1904, is £618 7s 5d. The amount of including interest to 31st December, 1904, is £618 7s 5d. Ti amount of travelling expenses paid in connection with the Assembly held it Sydney in

1903 was £159 19s 9d.

The Travelling Expenses Account gives the details of the argunts paid to the representatives of the various States, Assembly officials and conveners

showing a total of £201 15s 9d.

Your Committee recommends that the expenses for this Assembly be paid on the same lines and in the same proportion as for last Assembly, namely: —"That members attending the General Assembly in September, 1905, have the following percentages of their travelling expenses (calculated upon the basis of second-class railway return fares) paid by the Church, viz. :-(a)

those paying less than £1, nothing: (b) those paying from £1 to £4, to receive half; (c) those paying from £4 upwards, to receive three-quarters, provided that no one in class (b) shall pay less than £1 himself, and no one in class (c) less than £2."

It is further recommended that instruction be given to assess the State Assemblies for the General Assembly's expenses on the same lines as formerly, to wit, New South Wales £40, Victoria £40, Queensland, South Australia, and Tasmania, each £13 6s 8d, and Western Australia £10 per annum.

Your Committee would also ask directions regarding the sum of £55, which has been received from the Treasurer of the Presbyterian Church in England for bush work in Australia, the amount at present being held in suspense.

A sum of £8 4s 3d stands at credit of the Home Mission Committee's Account, and it is recommended that this be retained on hand as against

Convener's expenses.

A sum of £6 13s 3d is at credit of the Foreign Missions Account, and your Committee recommend that this sum should be transferred to the credit of Travelling Expenses Account, as part payment of the sum of £15 11s 10d paid on account of the travelling expenses of the members of the Foreign Missions Committee.

#### VII.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE RECORD.

Your Committee beg to report that the circulation of the Record has slightly increased since the last meeting of the General Assembly, the total number of copies sent out in 1903 having been 8934, while in 1905 the number

is 9834, an increase of 900 copies.

It is, however, disappointing to find that the Record, which is intended for the young people of the Commonwealth, does not circulate outside Victoria as it ought to do, as may be seen from the table below. In New South Wales, for instance, the number taken is only 1248, as against 6564 circulating in Victoria. Of course, in those States which have a smaller Presbyterian population, we cannot expect to have anything like the total circulation in Victoria. But there is room for improvement everywhere, and it would be of advantage to the progress of our enterprise if Ministers of Churches and Superintendents of Sabbath Schools would heartily recommend the Record to their congregations and scholars, with a view to its reaching a wider circle of readers. There are many who do so already, and we are grateful for their kindly cooperation; but much more might be done in this direction.

We try to make the magazine as informing and as attractive as possible, and that many of our people, old and young, welcome its appearance month

by month we are well assured.

We trust that by its help the young people of our Sabbath Schools have been stirred up to greater interest in Missions, and that it has had an educative influence on our scholars, giving them a wider horizon than otherwise they would have.

We append below for the benefit of the Assembly a table showing the circulation in the various States of the Commonwealth and in New Zealand,

and the increases and decreases in each case:-

In the face of this, we could not ask, or get even if we did ask, any of the advertisers to continue at the rates we were obliged to charge. And as there was a loss on the sales of the book, and we could not get anything in the way of a guarantee that an increased number would be taken, we were reluctantly obliged to abandon the publication of an issue for 1905.

# REPORT OF MODERATOR RE VISITATION OF STATES IN THE COMMONWEALTH.

As requested by last meeting of the General Assembly, I devoted seven months to the work thus indicated, in the States of Tasmania, South Australia, and Western Australia, in the order named. I had also arranged to devote three or four months from May last to a visitation of Queensland, but was prevented from carrying out this intention by an expressed opinion of the authorities of the Church there to the effect that, under existing circumstances, my visit, much as they desired it, would not be attended with such benefit as might be expected under more favourable conditions. The negotiations were concluded with a request that the visit should be postponed to the following year, and I promised that, in the event of my successor being

unable to undertake the work, I would be prepared to act as his substitute,

should the Assembly approve of such an arrangement.

It gives me special pleasure to say that in the States visited, the courtesy and kindness of my brethren in the Ministry, as also of the office-bearers and members, left nothing to be desired. No efforts were spared in making such arrangements for my work as would be calculated to be agreeable to me and beneficial to the Church. I was strongly impressed with the conviction that the appearance of the Moderator at not only the centres of population, but also and specially at the remote settlements, is calculated in a high degree to enable our people to realise the unity and influence of our Church, to strengthen their devotion to her teaching and organisation, and increase their courage under the difficulties which in many instances they have to face. My hope and expectation, therefore, are that the General Assembly will see its way to making such arrangements as will enable the representative in chief of the Church's pastoral oneness and devotedness to her members, old and young, to visit by arrangement all the States comprised in the Commonwealth, specially those most urgently in need of her sympathy and assistance.

I cordially take this opportunity of recording my appreciation of the generosity of the authorities in West Australia in granting me, at the instance of the Moderator of our Church there, a free pass over all the railways of the State, and their thoughtful attention to my comfort when travelling by night trains, and make this acknowledgement the more heartily that this was the only State that manifested such appreciation of the purpose of my visit, and thus furnished an example which the authorities in other States

would do well to follow.

It will, I hope, not be regarded as intrusive to add a few observations on the religious needs of the States visited, and offer some suggestions as to

ways and means by which these needs might be overtaken.

The difficulties to be met are much the same in all of them; namely: the creation of new settlements; migration from the older settlements; the tendency to abandon Christian efforts in the old ones; the apparent impossibility of supplying it effectively in the new ones; and the lack of a suitable, adapt-

able, and abiding agency.

The last of these is undoubtedly the one that ought most earnestly to engage the practical attention of the Church. In the States where these difficulties are most felt and appear most formidable, efforts are being made Tasmania is endeavouring to maintain and increase the to overcome them. supply of religious ordinances to the somewhat isolated but important mining communities in the south-west portion of that island, as also on the north-eastern side, where farming and shipping industries are making steady progress. The Assembly of South Australia has set apart one of its ministers as Organising Agent, whose salary for a period of three years has been subscribed by members of the Church in all parts of the State; while the Assembly of West Australia has appointed one of its ministers to make his headquarters at Geraldton, and visit all the numerous mining and other settlements situate beyond it.

These actions are encouraging, but they are yet inadequate to meet the Sooner or later the Church of all Australia will have to consider in what way, whether by appointing special agents or otherwise, she can best arrange to bring the message of God's mercy within the hearing of all who

look to her to meet their spiritual needs.

And the sooner it is done the better.

## REPORT OF THE JUDICIAL COMMISSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF AUSTRALIA.

The Judicial Commission has to report with a feeling of becoming thank-fulness that since last meeting of Assembly no case demanding action has occurred.

It has, however, been deemed expedient to officially inform the General Assembly that one of the Church's clergymen, the Rev. James Leask, M.A.,

resigned his status as a minister of the Presbyterian Church of Australia, and has entered the service of the Church of England, in the capacity of a lay agent. On receipt of his letter of resignation, the Moderator gave notice of the fact to the Chief Clerk of the General Assembly, and also to the Church Office in Victoria, with the request that the Presbytery in that State by which Mr. Leask was last received, might be informed of his resignation.

Acting on the advice of the Commission, he further communicated the

facts of the case to the Right Reverend Principal Rainy, Moderator of the United Free Church of Scotland, to which Church Mr. Leask was subject when commissioned for service in Australia.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC OUESTIONS, 1905.

Your Committee have to report that the earliest opportunity was taken to consider arrangements best adapted for celebrating the four-hundredth anniversary of the birth of John Knox. It was agreed (a) that the General Assembly of Australia, appointed to meet at Melbourne in September, 1905, should devote the Friday evening of its session to the observance of the important ceremony; (b) to request the Public Questions Committee in Victoria to make all necessary arrangements for the due observance of this function; and (c) that, as it regards the other States in the Commonwealth, it be left to the respective Assemblies to make such arrangements as might be most These recommendations were conveyed to the authorities interestsuitable. ed, and have been cordially received and acted on. The reports from the States show that the name and the work of the great Reformer have been recognised with a becoming enthusiasm. It now remains for the Supreme

Assembly to finish the ovation in a way worthy of itself and of the occasion.
Your Committee thankfully acknowledge the kindness of the Victorian
Committee in making the best arrangements in their power for this event.
The threatened deportation from Queensland of Kanakas who, during the time of service, have been married to women of British birth and have families, and also others of them who have acquired property, without allowing compensation, and in disregard also of the fact that they are Christians, has engaged the attention of your Committee. Communications were had with the late Premier of the Commonwealth, who quite recognised the injustice of the position, and the Victorian Committee on Public Questions has been asked to interview the present Premier on this humane and important

Your Committee have satisfaction in recording that the Divorce Bill which they were instructed to watch and to oppose has been withdrawn. they wish to express a decided opinion that, although the effort made by Mr. Dobson's Bill to introduce uniformity was defective by making the easiest divorce the standard for all, yet the law should, as soon as possible, be made uniform, if possible, by the adoption of the least lax of the divorce laws prevailing in the States of the Commonwealth.

#### STATISTICAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1904.

The schedule of questions approved and recommended for adoption by the last General Assembly has been used by Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland, and, with slight alterations, by South Australia. The Tasmanian and West Australian schedules were not so full, and as the statistical report of South Australia does not give all the schedule questions, full information concerning these Churches is lacking. Unless the Conveners of the

Statistical Committees of the State Churches furnish complete and full re-Church in the Committee cannot hope to gauge the general progress of our Church in the Commonwealth. We recognise that some years must clapse before our ministers generally can be educated as to the importance of supplying all the information the schedule demands. In the meantime our reports must necessarily be somewhat defective. If the adopted schedule is regularly sent out year by year, we feel confident that ministers knowing what is expected will take care to systematically tabulate the information desired.

The Assembly will understand that this Committee is not responsible for the figures supplied by the Conveners of the Committees of the State In the case All we can do is to take the tables as furnished. Churches. of Tasmania, where five charges sent in no returns, we have endeavoured to supply the blanks with figures for the year 1903. In the case of Queensland, where it seems there were four defaulting congregations, we have been unable to do this, nor with West Australia, where a like number of congregations sent in no returns.

At the last census, 1901, the Presbyterian population of the Commonwealth was 426,105; at the end of 1902 it was estimated at 439,030. Allowing for a percentage increase of Presbyterians in the several States, our population should now be :--

Owing to incomplete and defective returns, it is impossible to form any idea as to how many of these Presbyterians are reached by our Church organisations. The question in the schedule which attempted to elicit this information has not received full attention. In New South Wales, for instance, we find that there are 70,399 individuals known to ministers as Presbyterians out of an estimated number of at least 142,640. In Victoria, where there are about 192,931 Presbyterians, the returns account for 112,546. The Queensabout 192,931 Presbyterians, the returns account for 112,546. The Queensland returns account for 7,416 out of a Presbyterian population of about 60,237. South Australia, West Australia, and Tasmania have made no attempt to enumerate the Presbyterian population.

The Victorian Church employs 66 Home Missionaries and 11 Students, and the New South Wales Church 35 Students and Catechists, Tasmania 10 Home Missionaries, South Australia 5 Home Mission Agents, Queensland 9 Home Mission Agents and 2 Ministers in Mission Statistics. tions, West Australia 6 Home Missionaries.

The preaching centres include those places where occasional services are held. The-total shows 268 such places more than last report. Increase:—Victoria, 27; New South Wales, 150; Queensland, 86; South Australia, 1; Tasmania, 4.

ATTENDANCE.—These figures are the addition of the average attendances at the morning, evening, and afternoon services in Victoria; of these services and that at out-stations for New South Wales and South Australia; and of the morning and evening services in Queensland. The West Australian return is "average attendance for the year." For Tasmania it is the "estimated

number attending services."

BAPTISMS.—Tasmania furnishes no return. The other returns are manifestly incomplete when they are compared with the birth rates of the several States. Assuming that the Presbyterian birth rate is very slightly lower than the services of the several states. the average (this inference is based upon the fact that Presbyterians in New South Wales marry later than those belonging to other denominations, the Congregationalists excepted), and allowing for a certain number of children remaining unbaptised, our returns must be very far short of the actual number of children baptised.

The same incompleteness is shown in the returns of deaths. We have no reason for believing that Presbyterians enjoy a lower death rate than the rest of the population, and our returns place the Presbyterian death rate at an

absurdly low figure in each State.

MARRIAGES.—If any return should be accurate this might be expected to so. Even if we allow for a certain number of marriages celebrated by Ministers Emeriti, and a number performed by other ministers who are not in charges, the discrepancy between the returns of the Government Statists and our returns show the incompleteness and untrustworthiness of the latter. The following figures give in the first place the number of marriages performed in the various States accordingg to our schedules, and then the number celebrated by Presbyterian Ministers according to the Government official returns:

Victoria—1,344, 1,414; New South Wales—1,118, 1,398; Queensland—198, 444; South Australia—52, 128; West Australia—no return, 187; Tas-

mania-no return, 185.

In Victoria, where, according to the 1901 census, the Presbyterian populatian is 16.2 of the whole population, 17.2 per cent, of the total marriages

were celebrated by Presbyterian Ministers.

In New South Wales, where the Presbyterian population was 9.9 per cent. of the marriages for last year 13.4 were celebrated by our ministers. In this State 700 marriages were celebrated at matrimonial agencies-i.e., 6.72 of the total number of marriages.

In South Australia (Presbyterian population, 5.2) 5.05 per cent, of the

marriages were celebrated by Presbyterian Ministers.

Queensland (Presbyterian population, 11.7), Presbyterian marriages 14.4 per cent. of total.

Tasmania (Presbyterian population, 6.8), marriages 14.07 per cent. West Australia (Presbyterian population, 8.2 per cent), marriages 8.9 per cent of total.

#### (4.) RETURN TO REMIT ON REVISED SCHEME FOR THE TRAINING OF HOME MISSION AGENTS.

At Sydney, and within St. Stephen's Church, Phillip Street, on Tuesday, the sixteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and five years, which day the State Assembly of New South Wales being met and duly constituted.

Inter alia: The Assembly proceeded to consider the Revised Scheme for the Training of Home Mission Agents remitted by the General Assembly of Australia. The scheme was amended, adopted and ordered to be transmitted to the General Assembly of Australia, as follows:—

1. That the Agents who are to be admitted to this special course of training be men who are over

1. That the Agents who are to be admitted to this special course of training be men who are over twenty-three (23) years of age, approved of as to attainments, gifts and Christian consistency by the State Assembly having proper jurisdiction, and accepted by the General Assembly of Australis.

2. That such accepted Agents shall devote themselves to a preliminary course of four years' training, from the date of their acceptance by the General Assembly, and shall within that period pass (a) the Matriculation Examination of a recognised University, or (b) the Senior Public Examination in connection with the University of Sydney, or (c) where the University has no accessible Matriculation Centre, a special Examination, held on the Matriculation paper set by the University and examined by the College Committee according to the same percentage applied by the University; and thereafter shall also within the same period attend and pass at least four University Classes approved of by the General Assembly's College Committee, or pursue the course of study and examination prescribed by the University under direction of the General Assembly's College Committee.

3. That during the course special attention shall be given to the contents of the English Bible, English Language and Literature, Logic, Mental and Moral Philosophy, History and Political Economy.

4. That those who pass the course shall be eligible as Candidates for entrance to one of the Theological Halls of the Church, and shall be examined on all the subjects of the Syllabus save Latin, Creek, and Hebrew.

5. That during the recess of the Hall the Agents shall, as far as possible, be provided with work in their own State.

6. That after finishing their Hall course and passing the Exit Examination they shall serve in the State in which their preliminary training was given for a period of at least four years.

7. That, where any dispute shall arise as to the States named in clauses 5 and 6, it shall be determined by the Home Mission Committee of the General Assembly of Australia.
